THAT MEMORIAL AGAIN.

The Dean of Westminster is increasing neither his popularity nor the respect which is entertained for him by his course of action in regard to the memorial of the late Prince Imperial in Westminster Abbey. His reply to the deputation that waited upon him showed rather the cunning of a pettifogger than the ingenuous dignity of a benefited clergyman. His chief point, that Mr. Carlyle did not sign the protest against the memorial, has been answered by Mr. Carlyle stating that his name had been signed with his approval. That "the utmost the Prince ever contemplated was that if it was the wish of the majority of the French people that he should return, he was not unwilling to do so," is directly in contradiction with the revelations of M. Paul de Cassagnac. That Henry VII's Chapel, where the memorial is to be erected, is not part of the Abbey is a wretched quibble. I am sorry that the Dean should have been led into pursuing a course most disrespectful to the French nation, and contrary to the wishes of a vast number of Englishmen, owing to his endeavors to reconcile his duties as a dean with those of a courtier, for in the main I am one of his admirers.

THAT NAUGHTY MR. GRISSELL.

Sir Stafford Northcote evidently thought that he had quite enough to do without thinking any more about Mr. Grissell. That somewhat impudent specimen of the London sparrow, as our readers will remember, flew over to Boulogne last year when the Serjeant-at-Arms tried to put salt on his tail. Then, the day before Parliament adjourned, knowing that his punishment could only last one day, he came back, and was very penitent (with his tongue in his cheek.)

MR. GRISSELL AT THE BAR OF THE HOUSE.

The orders of the day being called on, it appeared that the first was set forth under the heading "Privilege (Tower High Level Bridge (Metropolitan Committee))" "Let Charles Edmund Grissell be brought to the bar," said the Speaker. The Serjeant-at-Arms, whose spotless white kid gloves bore testimony to the unusual solemnity of the occasion, thereupon advanced to the table, and taking up the mace retired with it, walking backward and bowing. As he passed the cross-benches two messengers stepped forward and drew out from an unsuspected recess at the back of the bench a thin pole. A similar one being drawn out, telescope fashion, from the bench on the other side, the two meeting midway across the gangway formed the veritable bar of the House. Then the Serjeant-at-Arms returned, the prisoner of the House walking by his side. Remaining seated the Speaker recited the heads of the prisoner's offence, laying especial stress on the circumstance that the House is nearly four weeks in session, and he had not earlier made submission. When the Speaker had reached the end of the indictment there was a pause, during which the prisoner was endeavouring to master the emotion which controlled him, and against which he fought by clutching at the bar. In a funeral tone, which sometimes threatened into final silence, he expressed his "satisfaction" at enjoying the opportunity of personally appearing before that most honourable House in order that he might humbly apologise. With respect to his aggravation of offence in not earlier making this submission the prisoner rather threw the blame on a "morning journal," which, he said, had published a paragraph that led his friends to the conclusion that the House did not desire to have public business impeded by so insignificant an individual as himself. The Speaker, rising and addressing the House, asked whether it was its pleasure that the prisoner at the bar should withdraw in the custody of the Serjeant-at-Arms whilst his conduct was taken into consideration. The House assented, and the Serjeant-at-Arms, again shouldering the mace, conducted the prisoner to the portals, where he was taken into custody by one of the messengers, the Serjeant-at-Arms himself returning to replace the mace on the table.

The bar was then withdrawn from view. The Chancellor of the Exchequer moved "Charles Edmund Grissell, having evaded punishment for his offence against the privileges of this House until the close of last session, be committed to her Majesty's Gaol of Newgate, and that Mr. Speaker do issue his warrant accordingly."

Mr. Forster seconded the proposal. The motion was unanimously agreed to.

DR. RUSSELL AND THE ZULUS.

Military authorities say that Dr. Russell was in an exceedingly bad temper when he wrote his letters to the *Telegraph*, running amuck among our soldiers in Zululand with his mighty pen. It appears that friend "Billy" was "drawn" by certain young officers who do not look with due reverence upon the sacred office of special correspondent, and this soured his naturally sweet temper. From accusing the British officer of "making hay" to accusing the British soldier of murder, theft, arson, and all the seven deadly sins, was but a step. I wonder if Sir Bartle Frere was one of the "drawers" of this little bill. It will be remembered that when Dr. Russell accompanied the Prince of Wales to India, to record his doughty feats in pig-sticking, he found his bed-room on board the *Serapis* in a state like an Afghan village after a British regiment had been through it. Lords Carington, Aylesford, Boreford and the rest of the precious crew who formed the escort in that memorable journey were popularly accused of the offence, but somehow I fancy Sir Bartle had a twinkle in his eye which would show him not unacquainted with the setting of booby-traps and the making of apple-pie beds.
