## Series Opens Today

The World Series will swing into action today and all indications are that it will be a real thriller. The Yankees and the St. Louis Cardinals both finished up strong in order to lead their respective leagues to the wire. The Yankees came through with 15 victories in their last 19 starts after stumbling through a mediocre season to lead the American League. The Yankees clinched the pennant on Saturday and then battled 13 innings with the Cleveland Indians on Sunday before dropping a 2-1 decision. Chicago White Sox captured the runner-up spot and the Baltimore Orioles were third place.

The Cardinals finally captured the National League flag after the Philadelphia Phillies went into a full spin to create a hectic duel between the Phillies, Cardinals and Cincinnati. The Phillies virtually collapsed with two weeks left in the schedule. Philadelphia was spending 4 1/2 days a game at that point and appeared to have everything sewed up.

The New York Mets almost slipped disaster for the Cardinals in their last three games of the season. The Mets took the first two titles and the Cardinals needed a win in the last game in order to secure the flag. The Mets held a 3-2 lead until the fifth frame, but Johnny Kneass forced an error by the Cardinals, and the Cardinals' forces exploded to win the game 11-5 and bring the National League pennant to rest in St. Louis.

The Cardinals team is rated as a well balanced team by the National League followers, as they came on strong in the final stages of the schedule. Thus the National League will be well represented against the Yankees who will be out for revenge after their humiliation at the hands of the Los Angeles Dodgers in last year's World Series.

The Dodgers sent the Yanks to the showers last October; defeating them in four straight games to win the world championship.

Cardinal backers must buy 8-5 for the series and 6-5 for the first game. The odds mean a Yankee fan must bet \$9 to win \$5 on the series. The odds are 7-1 that New York will sweep the series, 20-1 against a Cardinal sweep.

Whitey Ford of the New York Yankees was on the mound Tuesday, lobbing some pitches in a time up session for today's World Series opener with the St. Louis Cardinals. Mickey Mantle was standing at the plate, giving Ford a target. Among the spectators around the cage was Stan Minal, the former St. Louis great. As Ford continued to throw them up easily, Minal apparently saw his opportunity for a successful comeback. Suddenly he rushed into the cage yelling: "He's great. Let me have a hit, let me have a hit."

Sullivan, 43, was born in Toronto and joined CP 34 years ago. In addition to Toronto service, he has worked for CP in Vancouver, Edmonton, New York and London as well as Toronto.

In addition to covering the 1960 Olympics, he was in charge of CP's Olympic news desk at New York in 1956 and the Empire Games desk two years later.

## Harmonica Man At Short In Yanks' Series Opener

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Injured Tony Kubek appeared lost to New York Yankees for the World Series Tuesday, but the Yankees remained 8-5 favorites over St. Louis Cardinals.

New York's cagey Whitley Ford opposes another left-hander, 23-year-old Ray Sadecki, in today's opener. Kubek, out of action for two weeks due to a jammed right wrist, probably will be replaced on the list of series eligibles by Mike Hegan. Commissioner Ford Frick was expected to give the Yanks permission for the substitution with the assent of Cardinal Manager Johnny Keane.

Phil Lintz, the harmonica-playing rascal who drew a \$200 fine from Manager Yogi Berra for tooting Mary Had a Little Lamb on a bus after the Yanks had lost four straight in Chicago, will play shortstop in Kubek's place just as he had done the stretch. This will be the 22nd Series start for Ford, a 35-year-old veteran whose Series record dates back to 1950.

The pitcher-coach managed a 17-6 win — last record for the Yanks on their way to a fifth straight National League pennant.

He has been to more series than any other pitcher (11), pitched in more games and won more (10). In his last line-up Friday night he clinched a pennant by beating Cleveland 5-2, allowing no hits in the first 7 1/3 innings.

Sadecki, on the other hand, is a youngster in his first series. In fact, only shortstop Dick Groat, outfielder Bob Skinner and relief pitcher Roger Craig have series experience.

The \$50,000 bonus lefty gets the starting call from Keane because he had to use Bob Gibson in relief to nail down the National League pennant in Sunday's finale.

## Art Arfons Sets Record

BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah (AP) — Art Arfons, whose 49.02 miles per hour run Monday set a land speed record, plans to push his jet-powered Green Monster to a clocking between 450 and 480 miles per hour Wednesday.

Arfons said he will try the 17,000-horsepower vehicle over two one-mile runs on Beas western salt flats. Averaging between 450 and 480 is his goal, he said.

The 35-year-old garage owner from Akron, Ohio, was timed at 47.9 and 39.6 miles per hour Monday for the 43.02 average and the record. His brother, Walt, on Friday set the previous mark at a 41.32 mile per hour timing.

"If everything is pointed to work, we'll make two runs about 8 a.m.," Arfons said. "We checked everything out and the car and conditions were fine."

## Wildlife Expert States Findings

TORONTO (CP) — A wildlife expert said Tuesday that a new breed, tested in New Brunswick during the summer as a possible replacement for DDT, may be less harmful to fish but more deadly to birds in areas sprayed.

George S. Wright, director of the Northeastern Wildlife Station in Fredericton, told the Canadian Institute of Forestry's annual meeting that the effect of phosphamidon on birds was drastic although no official figures are available.

The Canadian wildlife service is expected to report its findings on the use of the new drug first detailed phosphamidon study undertaken in Canada.

Mr. Wright said 160,000 acres of choice watersheds were sprayed with phosphamidon in June while 1,800,000 acres were sprayed with DDT. Both substances are used to combat spruce budworms.

He explained the study of pesticides after-effects is complicated by the fact that birds in the New Brunswick area have, in many cases, migrated from areas in the United States which have been treated with other chemicals against fire ants. He said birds arriving from these areas have two or more of the chemicals in their bodies.

## Yankees Favored In Series

ST. LOUIS (AP) — New York Yankees' Tony Kubek stood in the first round of the favorite odds against St. Louis Cardinals in baseball's World Series.

A sellout crowd of 32,000 will be on hand as the Yankees send veteran lefthanded ace Whitey Ford, 17-4, against young southpaw Ray Sadecki, 20-1.

Sunny and pleasant weather is forecast with temperatures ranging between 65 and 70 degrees. Game time is 1 p.m. CDT. All games are being carried on radio and television by the CBC.

The Yankees, who have won 20 of the 28 series in which they have played, are favored to win the series. The Cardinals have played in 10 series. They have met New York four times, winning two, losing two.

The second contest will be in St. Louis Thursday before the teams move to New York for three games Saturday, Sunday, and if necessary, Monday.

All games in which they are needed, will be played in St. Louis Oct. 12-15.

The Yankees will be without shortstop Tony Kubek, who has a jammed wrist.
