The airmen were strong contenders for league honors last year and they did win the Island intermediate title. This year they will probably be just as good a club if not better.

The Intermediate Abbies will field a strong starting lineup but may be a bit weak on reserves. They will have plenty of pitching from Jack Reedy, Donnie MacLean, John Szeizek and Cyril Smith. Charlie Ryan, an effective man on the mound, will likely be looking after the catching chores. And back at first base, after a two year absence will be long ball hitting Eddy Lund, a medical student at Dalhousie University, will remain at home for the summer.

Another medical student who will be in the Province for the summer and who rates with anyone on the ball field in the Island League is Phil Murphy. The versatile Murphy who pitches, plays the outfield, first base or catches, will likely be a life saver on the North Shore for the summer months and will be unable to get away in the evening to play much ball. However if most of the games at Charlottetown should be played at night Murphy may be available for the intermediates.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—What's happened to Bobby Shantz? Baseball fans are asking about the Philadelphia Athletics south-paw, last year's most valuable player in the American League who won 24 and lost 7. So far this season he has won three and dropped five. Now he's sidelined at least two more weeks. Bobby injured his shoulder in Boston last week.

Bobby said Wednesday: "It feels like something is loose in my shoulder. I tried to throw yesterday but it wasn't any use. I could not get a thing on the ball."

Bobby suffered a fracture on his forearm about three inches above his pitching wrist last September when hit by a pitched ball thrown by Washington's Walt Masterson. "The wrist hasn't bothered me," he said. "I know a lot of people feel that I have been favoring the wrist, and as a result pulled a muscle in my shoulder. Maybe I have. I don't know."

"One thing is sure, I haven't been getting the same curve on the ball I used to get."

Trainer Packy Schwartz thinks the shoulder trouble is nothing more than a pull. "Packy says he can feel the 'pull' and that rest and heat treatments will work it out. I'm going to try and throw each day until I get the strength back in my arm."

"I still think I can win 20 games and help this team."

Arthur Ehlers, general manager of the club, said: "Before he injured his shoulder the kid was firing that ball as hard as ever. There was nothing wrong that a few of those right breaks wouldn't help."

Savoie-King Fight For British Empire Title

TORONTO, (CP)—Promoter Frank Tunney announced Wednesday that the Armand Savoie-Arthur King fight here June 8 will be for the British Empire and Canadian lightweight titles.

King, Toronto-born battler who has been fighting out of Philadelphia the last few years, holds the Empire title and Montreal-born Savoie is reigning Canadian champion.

King and Savoie fought here three years ago and drew the largest indoor gate in this city's history \$24,000. King won that one and since then Savoie has beaten two world's champions in non-title bouts, featherweight Sandy Sacier and lightweight Jimmy Carter.

Former Baseball Great Dies At 82

WORCESTER, Mass., (CP)—Jesse C. Burkett, 82, one of baseball's all-time greats, died Wednesday.

Burkett, elected to baseball's Hall of Fame in 1946, was one of three players to bat more than 400 in three seasons. Others were Rogers Hornsby and Ty Cobb.

Burkett's highest mark was 421 in 1895 with Cleveland. The next season he hit 410 and with the St. Louis Browns in 1899 he batted .402. An outfielder, he retired in 1905 with Boston Americans.

Returning from the Coronation in Westminster Abbey Queen Elizabeth wears the imperial crown and carries the sceptre and orb.
