The Self-Binding Harvesters.

INVENTORS EXPERIMENTING—HOW PERFECTION IS REACHED.

At the invitation of Mr. Alex. Horne, who is the Agent in this Island of the Walter A. Wood Mowing and Reaping Machine Company,

The cutting part of this self-binding harvester is just like that of the now common "reaper," only the knife is longer. It cuts off "at one fell swoop" about six feet from the side of a field of grain.

The binder is entirely automatic, and requires no attention from the drivers, excepting to adjust it back and forth, so as to place the band around the centre of the bundle, which is easily done by a lever convenient for the purpose.

As the grain is delivered into the binding receptacle by the elevators, it is selected from the upper side by revolving packers, (two wheels 12 inches in diameter and 9 inches apart, with 3 fingers attached to each), and is forced forward and packed, or compressed against a compound or compressing lever; and as soon as enough has been gathered to form a bundle, the force, or pressure, of the packer trips this lever, causing the packers to stop and the binding apparatus to begin.

As before stated, the packer gear and binding gear are placed above the binding receptacle, and the bundle is formed and bound from above; but the needle arm and discharger are placed below the receptacle, and remain at rest until the bundle is bound.

As soon as the bundle is formed and the binding gear begins to move, the needle arm advances, carrying the new twine over the bundle and knot-tying hooks to the grasper; and the bundle is tightly compressed and held between the needle arm and compound lever, relieving the twine of all strain while the knot is being tied, the grasper opens and closes, grasping and cutting the twine, and retaining the new end; the needle arm recedes, the compound lever is lifted up out of the way, the discharger arm advances and deposits the bundle gently on the ground, and then recedes; the binding apparatus is thrown out of gear, and the packers begin forming the next bundle.

The sheaves are made of one uniform size. The band or twine is put on every sheaf at exactly the same part of it; and it can be placed near the head, or in the middle, as required, and by slight changes the binder can be set to bind three sizes of bundles—small, medium and large, as the condition of the grain may necessitate, or the owner prefer. There is no trouble with foot level, as the binder controls itself throughout.

It is claimed that, owing to the shape of the binding receptacle, and the action of the packers, the binder will handle tangled grain—anything that the harvester will elevate—as well as straight grain; and any one not familiar with the machine would be surprised to see how nice a bundle it will make of the tangled, twisted mass of straw, with which it frequently has to contend.
