GRAND DIVISION.

Quarterly Meeting Held at Daruley.

The Grand Division S. of T., men in quarterly session at Daruley on Thursday the 27th inst. G. W. P., John C. Clarke, Esq., presiding. Although the roads were bad and the day very cold, the meeting was large and representative, all the officers being present but three.

The G. W. P. gave a very full and interesting report of his first quarter's work. G. W. P. Clark was only a few days in office when he was required to represent our Grand Division at the Jubilee Celebration of the Grand Division of Nova Scotia at Halifax in November last and since then he has found the calls on his time many. However he has met them all very promptly.

The Grand Scribe's report was very encouraging. In view of the important issues now before the temperance people and to help to advance the cause, a prologation committee consisting of the Grand Worthy Patriarch, Grand Scribe and Treasurer was appointed and funds placed at their disposal for that purpose.

The question of legislation on the liquor traffic at our next session of the local house was dealt with in so mountain way. The invention of Premier Warburton to the Grand Division to cooperate with the government in framing a liquor bill was met with the following resolution which was passed with but one dissenting vote:

Whereas, we are informed that legislation shall be introduced at the next session of the local legislature regarding the liquor traffic, especially as affecting the City of Charlottetown, Therefore Resolved that we, as the Grand Division of Prince Edward Island, do hereby reaffirm our position regarding such local legislation, that we are emphatically opposed to any measure that in any way permits or countenances the sale of liquor as a beverage.

The following representative with the G. W. P. and G. Scribe were appointed as a committee to make arrangements for the celebration of our jubilee as a Grand Division: G. W. A. Henry Rackham and P. G. W. P's, J. R. Edwards, S. W. Crabbe, D. Arbing, Wm. Laird, Rev. W. J. Kirby, Wm. Ho. Wood, Arthur Simpson and William McNeil Simpson.

The public meeting, in the elegant new public hall, at Daruley, in the evening was a decided success. The room was literally packed. G. W. P. Clark assisted by G. W. A. Rackham, presided in his usual happy way. The entertainment was excellent, every part being in good taste and elevating. Great credit is due the people of the community for their effort, and particularly for the very good order of the meeting from opening to close.

EVE OF ANOTHER NATIVE WAR.

BRITAIN MAY SOON HAVE HER HANDS FULL WITH THE BASUTOS.

There Will Also Probably be Trouble With the Zulu Race.

Advices from South Africa state that the Presidential election in the Transvaal is being watched with considerable amount of interest, not only on account of the vast British interest that exists in the Transvaal, but likewise because there is every indication that Great Britain is on the eve to another big native war in Southern Africa a war compared with which all those that have taken place until now will appear mere child's play.

Nor is it the Basutos alone who are likely to cause trouble in the near future. From mistaken notions of philanthropy, the Government has authorized the repatriation of Dinazulu and other exiled Zulu chiefs. Now Dinazulu is Cetewayo's son and heir. He is the hereditary head of the U-sulu tribe, which is the ruling clan of the warlike Zulu nation, and the Zulus on the gold fields openly declare that there will be fighting against the English the moment that Dinazulu returns.
