Chief Of Cameron Clan To Open Highland Games

Eldon, Scottish centre of the historic Belfast district, has been chosen as the site of the 1957 Highland Games sponsored annually by the Caledonian Club of Prince Edward Island. The big event, featuring a full program of piping and dancing competitions and a junior pipe band contest, will take place this year on Wednesday, July 31st. It is expected that Lt. Col. Donald Hamish Cameron of Lochiel, 26th Chief of the Clan, will be guest of honor at the Games. He will arrive in Canada two days before the big event in Eldon and has indicated his willingness to officially open the Highland Games

in Prince Edward Island. The skirl of the pipes and the flash of the kilt will be no novelty in Eldon which is in the heart of a widespread Scottish section of the province. The site of the Games will be a field overlooking the shore where Lord Selkirk and his 800 Highlanders landed in Prince Edward Island back in 1803. The Polly monument to the Selkirk settlers is located in the community and, along with the historic old French burying ground which predates the Scottish landing, will be of extra interest to visitors attending the Games. It is also fitting that Eldon should

be chosen as the site for the Highland Games this year in view of the fact that the new Wood Islands ferry, the Lord Selkirk, will likely be put into service before the end of the summer. An added advantage is that Eldon is only a few minutes ride from the ferry terminal on the Trans-Canada Highway, and it is felt this will enable contestants and spectators to come over from Nova Scotia for the day. The Eldon Women's Institute, and possibly institutes from some surrounding districts, will co-operate with the Caledonian Club of Prince Edward Island in staging the big annual event.

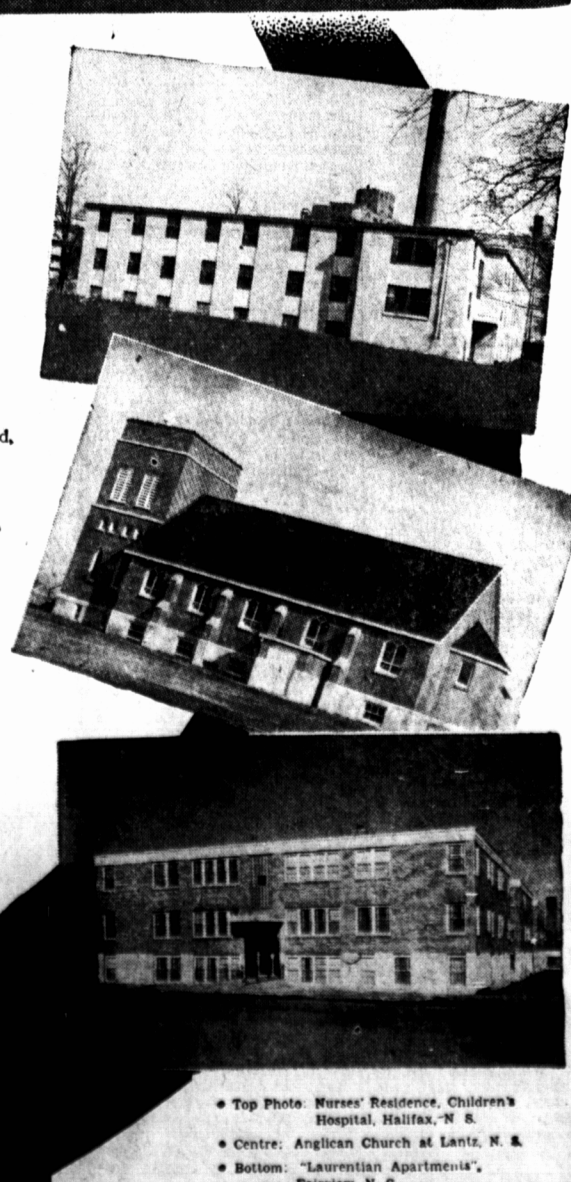
