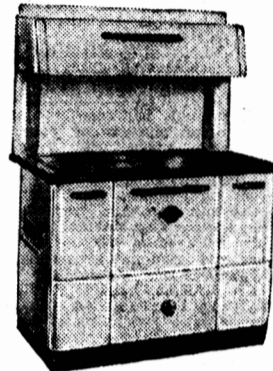

As a first step toward making a new life for yourself, I suggest a visit to a lawyer, or, if you cannot afford one, the Legal Aid Society. Find out how much support you can force your husband into, and get your own home as soon as you can. Since you realize how futile are the attempts to get him to establish a home for you, stop trying. You'll need all the physical and emotional strength you can muster to carry on your life, and care for your baby. As a final try, after you have ascertained your legal rights, tell your husband you won't see him again unless he is prepared to make a home for you, and be the man of the family. There's a faint possibility this may work; I doubt it, but it's worth a try.

**DEAR MISS DIX:** Is there a law compelling a husband to allow his wife so much money every week for her own use? My husband won't give me a cent unless I beg for it.

**ANSWER:** Regrettably, there is no such law; we could use it, though. The only recourse a wife has when she is fettered to a stingy husband is either to earn her own spending money or demand pay for her housekeeping chores. A man with padlocks on his wallet is a hard creature to reform, but sometimes he can be shamed into parting with a few pennies.

**DEAR MISS DIX:** I am 34 years old and go with a man 39. I have known him four years. I have two girls, and he has four children, smaller than mine. He loves me very much. I want to know if it would be a happy marriage.

**ANSWER:** If you are sure you love each other, and are both possessed of infinite patience and mutual consideration, yours could be a fine marriage. Its drawbacks are that both of you will have to consider all the children together as one family, treating each alike—rather than breaking the unit up into "my children" and "his children." Unless your economic position is fairly sound, you may have to do some close figuring to care for the family. On the other hand, you will have the advantage of giving a home, complete with father and mother, to six children. If you have the qualifications, go ahead and God bless you.

### P.E.I. Presbytery Hold Meeting

The March meeting of the Presbytery was held on Tuesday Mar. 4th in Zion Church Hall with the Rev'd. F. N. Young presiding in the absence of the Moderator Rev. G. B. Cunningham. The Clerk and Treasurer, Rev. T.H.B. Somers was at the desk.

On motion of Mr. Somers the following memorial minute was ordered inscribed in the records of the Court:

"The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island shares with the Nation and Commonwealth the profound loss and sorrow sustained in the passing of our beloved sovereign, George VI; offers thanks to God for his life of Christian faith and service; and prays that Heaven's richest blessings may rest upon our liege Lady, Queen Elizabeth II."

Word was received that the Rev. G. C. Webster was making some progress towards possible recovery and appreciation was voiced of the services of the Rev. T.H.S. Somers in supplying the pulpit during the hospital visiting for

the Zion Congregation. It was announced that Mr. J.A. Johnston, M.A., Student of Presbyterian College, Montreal, is to supply Zion pulpit from May to September.

The following were appointed Commissioners to the General Assembly which meets on June 4th in Knox Church, Toronto: Rev. Donald Nicholson, Rev. T.H.B. Somers, Mr. D.A. MacKinnon, Mr. A.A. MacDonald. The following elders were appointed alternates: Mr. J. Malcolm MacKenzie, Mr. Frank L. MacNutt, Mr. W.E. Forbes, Mr. R.A. MacKenzie.

Nominations were made by the Court for the Moderatorship of the General Assembly for the Principality of Knox College, but the Reverend Allan Farris was nominated for the Chair of Church History in Knox College. Nominations were also made to the membership of the Standing Committees of the General Assembly. The Clerk produced an application on behalf of the Rev'd. J.V. Crawford, M.A., to be received from the Presbyterian Church in Ireland into the ministry of the Canadian Church. This was sustained and ordered sent to the Assembly. A call from St. John's, Belfast, in favour of the Rev'd Donald Campbell was tentatively sustained by the Court and ordered sent to Mr. Campbell for his decision. Mr. John Falconer and Mr. Alex Morrison of the New London Charge spoke of the unanimous and earnest desire of his people that Mr. Campbell remain as their Minister. The Clerk announced that the Board of Administration had approved the application of the Presbytery that the proceeds from the disposal of the Dundas Property be returned in the form of a grant by the Board of Trustees for the Capital Fund of Camp Keir.

Reporting as interim-moderator of Murray Harbour North, Rev. F. N. Young stated that Mr. Carl Currie, B.A., graduating in theology this spring from the Presbyterian College, Montreal, had indicated his willingness to accept a call to the Murray Harbour North and Peter's Road charge.

Reporting for the Convener, Mr. Somers listed the grants, augmentation and travel allowances as well as applications for students and ordinands required for the coming year and on his recommendation they were approved for presentation to the Board of Missions in Toronto next week.

The Kirk Session of Wood Islands commended Mr. Goodwill

MacDougall as a candidate for the Ministry. The Presbytery will possibly take action in May.

Reporting for "The Christian Outreach Appeal," the Convener, Mr. Somers stated that the Assembly's Committee was very appreciative of what results had been so far attained and thanked all who had put forth effort to this end. A complete report is to be made to the Assembly in June. The Assembly's Budget Committee has announced that contributions to the Church's Budget for 1931 exceeded \$800,000 which represents an increase of 62 per cent in the past five years and of 110 per cent in ten years, making the largest budget giving since the Disruption in 1825.

The Treasurer in presenting his report stated that the Presbytery would be able to increase the travel grant allowed each member for car-transportation. The next Stated Meeting of the Court is appointed
