Receive Civilian Flying Licences

—Two students of the Summerside Flying Club, George Pope and "Bud" MacKenzie have been granted their civilian flying license and another student, Edison Baker, is expected to "graduate" on Sunday, having fulfilled the requirements necessary to qualify.

The average Summerside citizen is perhaps not aware that there is a civilian club in Summerside, which has been in existence for several months although they may have noticed several small aircraft flying over the town at various times. Sundays and holidays in particular.

The club was organized some time last May with Mr. A. G. Rogers as president and Mr. R. G. Pope as secretary and since that time has made considerable progress. As time passed the membership grew until today there are about 40 persons taking instruction in flying.

The local club has been greatly assisted by the co-operation of the members of the Moncton Flying Club and all the planes used for instruction purposes and all the instructors are from that club. The old commercial airport in Summerside has been obtained and work has been going on there for some time in an attempt to convert it into a first class landing field. However, up to the present, the club has not obtained a license from the Department of Transport to use it as an instruction base due to its proximity to residences but it is hoped that more land will be secured to the north, nearer the Pope Road, and when this is done it is thought that the requirements of the department will be fulfilled and the license granted.

At present only licensed pilots may use it as a landing strip and students of the club have been permitted to use the facilities of the R. C. A. F. Station to take off and land.

The membership is not strictly confined to young men for it boasts at least one intrepid young lady, Miss Jean Gordon, and her example will no doubt be followed by others in the months to come. It is understood that two of the above mentioned students, Messrs. Baker and MacKenzie are at present negotiating for the purchase of their own private plane.—S.

ever when he walked. That was because he was so fat and heavy. He wheezed as he waddled. Yes sir, he wheezed.

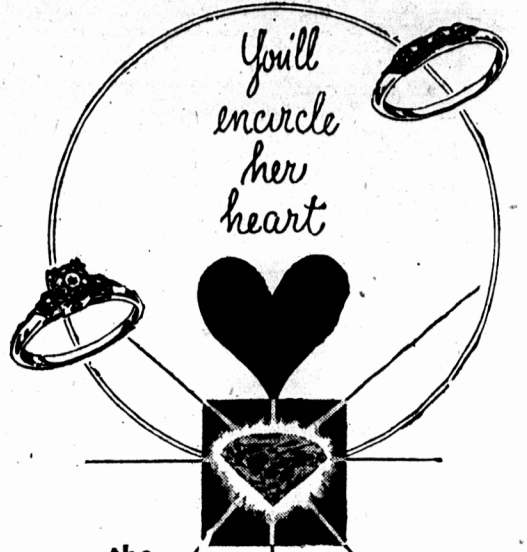
