MR. SUTHERLAND'S FUNERAL

Largely Attended Yesterday—Tributes to His Memory in the Church.

All that was mortal of Rev. David Sutherland was committed to the earth yesterday afternoon, and every religious body in the city was well represented in the large procession which followed the hearse to the People's Cemetery. Zion church, from which the funeral took place at four o'clock, was appropriately draped in mourning, significant of the great affliction that had overtaken the people to whose spiritual needs he had ministered so well during the past eight years.

At one o'clock, after funeral services at the house, the casket containing the body of the deceased clergyman was removed to the church where until three o'clock it reposed upon a catafalque in front of the pulpit. Here great numbers of people called to take a last look at one whom all loved. The casket and tables on either side contained floral offerings innumerable, that from the session and trustees being a broken column, and that of the choir a harp with a broken string.

By the time the hour for the funeral service to begin arrived the church was filled to the doors, and many could not obtain admission. The funeral service was touching in its simplicity, and included loving tributes to the memory of their deceased brother from Rev. G. M. Campbell and Rev. T. F. Fullerton.

After the service was concluded, the mournful procession left the church for the cemetery. The pall was borne by the following gentlemen, prominent members of Zion Church: D. Farquharson, John McPhail, David Schurman, David McInnis, W. M. Coffin and A. B. MacKenzie. The boys of the Sunday School participated in the procession, each one carrying a spray of white flowers which they subsequently deposited on the grave. The procession was the largest that has been seen in Charlottetown for years, and all along the route the streets were lined with people.

The service at the grave was conducted by Rev. Mr. Fullerton. Among the many beautiful wreaths sent as a tribute to the memory of the late Pastor of Zion Church, was that from Miss Annie E. Harris, Secretary of the Local Union of C. E.

An original method of raising a church debt comes from Samoa. At the little town of Apia, on the island, they have a cricket match in progress for three months. A fee of one shilling is charged for the privilege of batting, and, if bowled, the batsman can keep at the wicket by the payment of another fee. As a means of collecting money for church purposes the scheme has proven most successful.

In South Africa the success of the Afrikaners in the defeat of Sir Gordon Sprigg's ministry, it is predicted, will not be long lived. Mr. Hofmeyr, the Afrikaner leader, in the motion of non-confidence, had the votes of six English members of the Cape Parliament, and the tally stood 41 to 36. The victory is, it is asserted, a barren one.

Emperor William is an overworked monarch. Last year, according to a report issued by the chamberlain's office, the Kaiser received 1,055 immediate reports, gave 751 decisions, and signed 802 Cabinet orders, appointments, and other documents. Besides these there were 50,000 documents and over 145,000 letters and telegrams addressed to the Emperor which he never saw.

The generators are two in number and are driven by two engines directly connected. The Arkadia which is 4,000 tons burthen left New York on the 8th inst for Newport News where she will take on some batteries of artillery and stores. She will then proceed to Tampa, where she will take on infantry. Her port of destination will be either Santiago de Cuba or Porto Rico.
