Rotarians Addressed By Noted Visiting Novelist

"The tang of spruce and pine in the air in contrast with the palm trees and hot sun of Bermuda is a welcome change for a while as I visit P.E. Island every fall to enjoy a period of shooting and the tramp over the countryside which enhances the experience." Col. F. Van Wyck Mason said in addressing the weekly luncheon meeting of Rotarians at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Col. Mason, who was born in Massachusetts but for several years has resided in Bermuda, has achieved success as a writer of historical novels such as "The Golden Admiral," and is presently putting the final copy in shape for the publishers of "The Young Titan." This new historical novel deals with the siege and capture of Louisbourg by 4,000 men of the American colonies and a few added Crown Naval units. This "Gibraltar of America" was occupied for a year from 1745 when the Crown gave back to France, which was a blow to the Colonies chief.

First Asiatic Flu Vaccine Is Received Here

An initial supply of Asiatic flu vaccine has been received in the Province, Dr. L.M. Bonnell said in a news release yesterday. The provincial Minister of Health indicated that this amount, about 60 doses, has been allocated to the two largest hospitals in the Province in order that their medical and nursing staffs could be inoculated. A further supply is expected immediately, the Minister, adding that this will be distributed to the other hospitals in the Province for the same purpose. Dr. Bonnell indicated that there have been no confirmed cases of Asiatic flu in the province although there have been quite a bit of the usual types of influenza about. Some specimens have been sent to Ottawa for laboratory investigation the Minister said, but so far no evidence of Asian flu has been reported.

Also it is serving adequately in modern times.

"It's a parade of Fashions for Autumn" was sponsored by Moore and McLeod, Ltd. The show was held in the up-stairs lounge. It was worth attending the show if it had been only to see the table decorations. The tables seated four people. Each table was decorated with table mats of tartan. There were also brooms and curling rocks as ornaments. The table napkins had the same motif as the mats. This clever and original work was done by one of the club members, Mrs. J.S. Taylor. Mrs. Marion Duckendorff did an outstanding job on the sale of tickets.

As the guests settled themselves in the pleasantly informal atmosphere of the lounge to enjoy the show, Mrs. J.A. Likely, the popular president of the Ladies' Branch, Charlottetown Curling Club, greeted the guests. This was followed by a history of Curling" written in poetry by Mrs. Robert Sutherland and delivered with clever wit. It was "illustrated" by four members of the club. These were the following: Mrs. Wendell Beaton wore the going-away outfit of Mrs. (Major) Arthur A. Bartlett.

Miss Margaret Rankine and her wedding in Charlottetown seventy five years ago was a great social event. Mrs. Beaton, a very tiny size, having platinum blonde hair, the bun of which was tied with a black velvet ribbon was just the model for this autumn costume. The coat was made of heavily brocaded black velvet lined with pure silk in the striped Regency pattern seen even in wallpaper of that period. The hat, tippet and small round muff were of Alaskan seal. The hat was the style of the private soldiers of that period.

Mrs. Beaton's escort (Mrs. Edson Wood) wore a plaid suit, a high collar and carried a "broom like a bat". Mrs. Walter Goss had an aura of the 20's about her as she appeared in her costume. What other city could produce such a beautiful and authentic costume as that of the Bartlett-Rankine coat and accessories? Tweed goes high wide and handsome after dark. Fashions in wool are helping to slim the stout figure. Double breasted coats are high fashion, also loose coats with shoulder emphasis. "Lady Long-legs" or short and getting shorter epitomizes the skirt lengths in Paris this season! Hemlines at last night's show were just right. They portrayed what is really correct in costuming, the length that is suitable for individuals. Long jackets in suits, also wrist length and semi-fitted ones are in numerical lead but straight and belted ones are shown as well. With all the clothes chatter emerges the word "Chemise." This is a word currently being used by the fashion world to describe the season's newest dresses. They are entirely simple in line, just the barest suggestion of the figure underneath.

Last night's simply beautiful evening dresses were almost all cocktail length and again Paris says evening dresses are short, although great houses are featuring long evening dresses too. Hats ran the gamut from hoods of felt shaped into Phrygian caps, turbans, stovepipes, shallow-crowned sailors, berets, "Fuzzi-Wuzzi" hats which hug the head like a wig, hedgehog and the rage for raccoon. Civic Employees Vote To Affiliate With National Body

Voting 56-0 in favor of affiliation, the Charlottetown Civic Employees union (Local 501) last night decided to become a member organization of the National Union of Public Employees (CLC). The new charter is expected to be received from the parent body in less than three weeks.

This switch does not entail a break with the Canadian Labor Congress which had chartered the union local. President Staff Sergeant A.J. Dowling, who presided, informed the meeting, adding that the national union is a member of the CLC. Prior to the balloting the union members were addressed by John F. MacMillan, St. John, A.A. MacIsaac, M.L.A., and W. Reid, Deputy Minister of Labor.

"Your working conditions and wages are the most disgraceful of any place, big or small in the Maritimes," Mr. MacMillan informed the meeting. Mr. MacMillan is Maritime organizer for the National Union of Public Employees.

"Your charter is only a piece of paper that makes your union legal—your union is only as strong, as the people who are in it," he said.

Mr. MacMillan promised the union members that the national organization would promote their welfare "by every legal means."

It is expected that this agreement will be ready for presentation in a few days.

Mr. MacMillan indicated that he would assist in the preparation of the agreement and would be present when it was placed in the hands of the city council.

Other speakers heard at last night's special meeting of the local union included Mr. Peter J. MacDonald, chief organizer of the Charlottetown District Labor Council, Alex MacLean, vice president of the Council, and Jack Brown, a member of the Charlottetown Electrical Workers union.
