P. E. Island Lobstermen Report Serious Shortage of Bait

From several reports from various fishing centres in the Province it was learned last night the lobster bait in all sections is in very short supply. The shortage is apparently due to the prolonged cold weather and the slow movement of the ice. In Charlottetown, Mr. Douglas Burber said that all bait that had been put up last year at the local Cold Storage Plant was all cleared up by the end of the year. A few localities reported small catches yesterday and some was being brought in by Magdalen Island boats. No herring were caught yesterday at either Alberton or Tignish. Fishermen reported that previous catches obtained when the herring first appeared were sufficient for the first setting and yesterday. Supplies left on hand are very limited and one fisherman said it will be necessary to purchase supplies from other sources, the price of which will be exorbitant. In the Summerside, Egmont Bay and Miramichash area, bait was reported very scarce, with only ten barrels being taken at Egmont Bay and nine at Miramichash. In this area the take would normally be in the vicinity of five hundred barrels. One packer made the trip to New Brunswick yesterday and found the situation there almost as bad as in this Province. Lobster fishermen in the three areas mentioned are forced to pay as high as \$4.25 a barrel for bait. Such expenses will make serious inroads on the take-home pay of the fishermen as the market price of lobsters is not expected to be much above normal. At Murray Harbor and other eastern centres the situation is no different, with there being no local herring at all in Murray Harbor. Two boats are expected to arrive from the Magdalen Islands and it is hoped they will be carrying a good supply. The quantities previously obtained from the Magdalen vessels have not been very large. Throughout the Island fishermen are hoping that the predicted warmer weather will have the effect of bringing the local herring catches back to normal within a few days.

159 Blood Donor Deficit In First Two Days of Local Clinics

Mr. F. A. S. Jones, chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee for Charlottetown, said last evening that he was very disappointed with the results of the first two days of clinics when the attendance was just 541 on a quota of 700—a deficit of 159. "At least 800 will have to attend today and tomorrow's clinics in order to reach our objective," Mr. Jones remarked. He also said he hoped there would be 400 today and another 400 tomorrow, so that there would not be "one grand rush" on Thursday which will be the concluding day. Forty-seven of yesterday's donors were students from St. Dunstan's University for whom free transportation to the clinic was again provided through the courtesy of the Island Motor Transport Co. who supplied a group of S. D. U. students who will attend Thursday's clinic early in the afternoon. Over 50 of yesterday's donors came from points outside Charlottetown, and among the first in the afternoon was Mrs. Orrin Bell of Murray Harbor who came to Charlottetown specially to make her third donation. She remarked that she found it difficult to understand why so many people who are in good health and within the proper age limit are so hesitant about giving blood, and did not understand why the bus service for providing the transport service those attending the Music Festival in Charlottetown during the next two days should take advantage of the opportunity of making their contribution to the Blood Bank while they are in town. Efficient helpers for yesterday's clinics were provided by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion, the King's Daughters of Trinity Church, the Red Cross Corps and representatives of the High School and Parkdale Schools.

Trinity Men To Begin Annual Congregational Visit Tonight

Over 125 men of Trinity Church will start tonight on a good visit to the homes of the congregation. The men will in most cases work in pairs and expect to complete the task within the next ten days. On the last visitation undertaken by the men of the congregation it was noted that 1111 families in Charlottetown and vicinity belonged to Trinity Church and one of the chief purposes of the visit will be to ascertain what new families it was not getting and how the presence of a roomer or boarder who may be staying in another home. Another purpose of the visit will be to learn to what church congregations various members of a household belong. Trinity has at least 17 different organizations of which men, women and children may be members and it is the hope of the pastors that men will be able to associate themselves with one or more of these groups. For members of each district it may become necessary for members of the visitation team to call at the homes of other denominations. This will be to ascertain if there is another church in the area, the King's Daughters of Trinity Church, the Red Cross Corps and representatives of the High School and Parkdale Schools.

Ancient Tomb Fails To Prove That Shakespeare Was Faker

CHISLEHURST, Eng. (AP)—Shakespeare still is Shakespeare. In the dusty gloom of an ancient English church, the 400-year-old tomb of an Elizabethan nobleman was pried open Tuesday in an American's attempt to prove that Shakespeare was a faker living on somebody else's wits. All that was found was a trickle of yellow sand.

Calvin Hoffman, 49-year-old New York poet and drama critic who has searched 20 years for proof that Shakespeare's classics were written by Christopher Marlowe, was disappointed.

NOTHING INSIDE The tomb of Sir Thomas Walsingham, Marlowe's patron and friend, was opened on Hoffman's conviction that inside would be found the original manuscript of Macbeth, one or two sonnets at least and crumbling yellow papers proving his case.

"It's amazing, I just can't understand it," Hoffman said as he stood in the sun-drenched churchyard, autographing copies of his book "The Man Who Was Shakespeare." Hoffman's theory is that Marlowe, an erratic genius, ran afoul Queen Elizabeth's court for his heretical beliefs and was headed for the chopping block on Tower Hill.

Walsingham, arranged for a phony "murder" in a Thames-side tavern brawl passed off as an unknown sailor's body for Marlowe's at the inquest, and sheltered the dramatist under his roof. Shakespeare, then an unknown actor-manager according to Hoffman, was bribed to pass off Marlowe's work as his own.

Hoffman claims when Walsingham died, Marlowe's original manuscripts were buried in the family vault with him. After masons chipped through the brick vault Hoffman looked with a periscope through the six-inch hole cut in the brick.

"We opened the main portion of the tomb and found only sand. It would be futile to go on. Underneath the tomb there is a brick in vault and we haven't got permission to go in there, with the coffin."

Then he brightened. "Possibly the papers are in there," he said. "I'll come back after lunch and have another look."

But while he was having his lunch St. Nicholas church authorities sealed up the tomb and said it would not be opened again.
