It was revealed that Ferguson Industries of Pictou, N.S., had submitted the lowest bid when tenders were opened several weeks ago. The bid was for the same route four or five years ago. But until the action is finally approved at Ottawa, nothing definite will be known, and work will not get underway on the big ferry until the firm gets the official word from the capital.

monthwide trade he had proposed while in opposition. Members of that government had "suddenly become devoted exponents of that which they once opposed."

Mr. Dielenbaker said that although his free world trade concept proposal wasn't supported at the London conference, there was implied support for it in the Commonwealth declaration of readiness to back "comprehensive international efforts" to support world trade.

Referring to opposition party criticism of his position at London, he added:

"Can anyone be justified in not pointing out the effect on jobs in Canada, on agriculture in general, and also in the industrial field and raw materials, should Britain not secure the safeguards that were the essence of the British government's undertaking?"

Tariff preferences benefitting nearly half of Canada's exports to Britain would disappear by 1970 if Britain joined the Common Market without special safeguards.

## Tax Reforms Are Expected, Canada Is Told At Meeting

WASHINGTON (CP)—A hint that the free world expects Canada to seek some form of permanent tax reform was voiced by Per Jacobson, Friday at the International Monetary Fund conference held five-day conference, highlighted by an Anglo-American wrangle over proposed revisions in the international flow of currency.

Jacobson, fund managing director, told a press conference that in general, the Canadian government's statement that it is considering more permanent solutions to its balance of payments problems "was good and well received."

He suggested one of the problems for the Canadian treasury is to find a substitute source for the \$200,000,000 estimated to be obtained annually from the import surcharges of five to 15 per cent imposed last June 24.

The July-August rise in Canada's official reserves of gold and U.S. dollars had been "impressive," but its Justice Minister Fleming had told the fund Wednesday, the increase also included heavy Canadian borrowing abroad. Fleming said he doubted whether the improvement in reserves would continue at the high July-August rate.

Jacobson said it is an open secret that other countries are not happy to see increases in trade protection by one country at a time when the general international tendency is towards liberal expansion.

Five days after the McLeod speech, Dr. Ernest E. Long, council's permanent secretary, appealed for greater efforts at understanding between Protestants and Roman Catholics.

Many issues provoked heated debate among the 300 elected delegates, but the 60,000-word report on marriages and divorce—rated council's most insignificant action by veteran churchmen—proved careful discussion and virtual unanimity.

The church for the first time decided that divorce can be justified. Enforced adherence to the marriage bond in some cases can be more harmful to individuals, family and society than reluctant violation of the principle that marriage is a lifetime contract.

With a mild earnestness, council accepted without dissent the principle that "it should be possible for every husband and wife to secure information and means of conception control that are necessary for family planning."

On church union, a committee, engaged in negotiations with the Anglican Church of Canada during the last two years told council bluntly that, despite optimistic talk, the work has stalled on Anglican reluctance to recognize the validity of non-episcopal ministers in relation to bishop-ordained clergy.

## Russians Fire 15th Bomb Test

WASHINGTON (AP)—Another Soviet nuclear explosion is the atmosphere Friday was reported by the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission.

It said the detonation in the vicinity of Novaya Zemlya had a yield of "a few megatons."

A megaton is the blast force of 1,000,000 tons of TNT.

The Uppsala, Sweden, Seismological Institute had reported the blast earlier and estimated it at nine megatons.

This was the 15th shot in the current Soviet series that has been reported by the AEC. There have been indications too that others have been detected but not publicly reported.

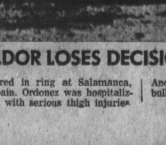
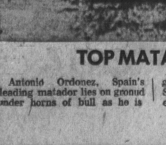

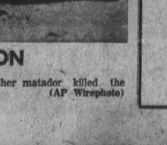
