Belgians Polite, Rotary Club Told

"Belgium has one of the highest standards of living in all Europe," according to J.A.G. Laforest, Rotary Foundation Fellow from Riviere du Loup, who addressed the weekly luncheon meeting of the Charlottetown Rotary Club yesterday.

Mr. Laforest, who explained that this was only the second time in his life that he had addressed a meeting in English, is visiting nine clubs in the Maritimes following a year of study at the Free University of Brussels in Belgium.

"Voting for all people 21 years of age and over is mandatory in Belgium," he said, and, "At present the country is governed by a coalition made up of five parties. The main industry, coal mining, has given way to manufacturing because of bad organization and a greater use of atomic power." Mr. Laforest said, "Belgians were extremely polite and always made an attempt to speak the language of their foreign guests." (All Canadians are considered to be English.) On one occasion his host insisted in answering in English even though Mr. Laforest spoke French.

"Belgians as a rule are industrious people; they enjoy comfort, drink and good food, and are fond of finding loopholes in the law, especially when it comes to taxation." He said, "It was understandable that they are preoccupied with thoughts of war having been the battle-
