The Mayor of Toronto has called upon the Council of the city for aid to relieve the distress among the workmen.

NOTWITHSTANDING the disagreeable weather the market to-day was fairly well attended and stocked. Prices unchanged.

The Canadian Pacific Railway depot at Ottawa was destroyed by fire on the morning of the 29th ult. The loss is about \$16,000.

A ST. PAUL society reporter makes his confession in the head line: "He finds warm welcome and north-temperate-zone snubs, but still lives."

JOSHUA SMITH, 18 years of age, of Lockhartville, N. S., was drowned in New York harbor last week. His body was recovered and brought home for interment.

A CORRESPONDENT reports that in the past season for oyster fishing, about 1,600 barrels of oysters were caught in Orwell River by Nova Scotia and New Brunswick vessels.

The steamer Fishwing, damaged by fire at St. John on Wednesday last, has been hoisted, and an examination of her hull is now being made. The damage to her machinery is about \$927.

Mr. Bagnall, who is the oldest son of John E. Bagnall, Esq., of Hazel Grove, now resides at North Bay, in the above Township. North Bay is an ambitious town, two years old, with an assessment roll already amounting to \$100,000.

THE late Miss Katherine Hayward, the Philadelphia Press tells, had Oscar Wilde introduced to her when that young man was in Washington. It was in the afternoon, and two brilliant social events were to occur that evening. Said she: "Mr. Wilde, will you go to the reception to-night?" "Well," he replied, "I am not too much fatigued after my lecture." A short pause followed, and then he said: "Miss Hayward, of course you will be at the reception?" "Well," came the answer, "if I am not too much fatigued after your lecture!"

THE Sea View Hotel, at Souris, of which Mr. B. Cox is the proprietor, had a narrow escape from total destruction by fire a few days ago. A little boy playing with a lighted pipe set fire to the window curtains. The flames quickly spread around the room, snapping up a table and several chairs in their course. The fire was extinguished as soon as possible, not however before damages to the amount of \$25 or \$30 were incurred. Mr. Cox was insured in one of the companies represented by F. W. Hyndman, Esq., whom he desires to thank for the prompt payment of his loss.

ALICE HALTER, a prepossessing girl of fourteen years, was arrested at Buffalo, N. Y., on a charge of arson. On Thursday night she desired to go to a party with the family of her employer, John J. Morgan. They refused to take her, and after the family had left the house, she put the two children who remained at home to bed, and then gathered a lot of paper and other inflammable material and piled some of it in the bedroom and some in a pantry. After saturating the pile with coal oil she set fire to them. While she was engaged in starting the bedroom, the hired man returned and put out the fire in the pantry. Seeing smoke issue from the sleeping apartment, he rushed in there and succeeded in stamping the flames.

A DALLAS, Texas, despatch of Jan. 23, reports that Detective Jack Duncan and Deputy Sheriff Seeley, of Freestone county, surrendered themselves to Sheriff Smith, stating that they killed several men in self-defence four miles from the city. Seeley and Duncan left Dallas Wednesday with a warrant for the arrest of Jesse Bonner, of Navarre county, for horse-stealing. They arrived at his home in the evening and entered without drawing arms, not expecting to encounter their resistances, but had not gone beyond the sill before three inmates opened fire, Jesse Bonner and one of two unknown men with revolvers and the other with double-barrelled shot gun, and one man was shot dead. The officers drew their revolvers, and a desperate fight ensued, during which the light was extinguished. In the course of the battle a woman yelled "My child is killed, oh my child." The firing did not cease until the last round of ammunition was exhausted and the crowd retreated. Neither Duncan or Seeley could believe the results of the fight, as, being without ammunition, they deemed it best to make escape as rapidly as possible.

THE Moncton Times says.—On Monday evening last the friends of Rev. S. R. Ackman assembled at the residence of Mrs. George Ayard, Jolicoeur, but before going away from the many pleasures enjoyed during the evening, the people of that preaching appointment, and other friends present, presented him with \$33 as an evidence of their esteem and good feeling.

MR. ON Sunday last, a man named Henry Bouchard, employed in a lumber camp, at St. Etienne, Que., was instantly killed, whilst blowing down the barrel of a supposed unloaded gun. It was in this act that the gun, which was loaded, suddenly discharged, the bullet entering Bouchard's mouth and coming out of the back of his head, killing him instantaneously.

AT half-past seven o'clock, on the evening of the 29th ult., an accommodation train left the track about six miles north of Campbellton, N. B., nine cars loaded with flour going over an embankment. A special was sent out from Campbellton to take the passengers and they were transferred. No one was hurt in the accident, which was caused probably by spreading rails.

AN Austin, Texas, despatch of the 28th ult. says:—On Tuesday afternoon, about four o'clock, from out of the clear sky a shower of very fine dust began falling. There was no wind at the time. The shower increased toward nightfall, and continued through half the night. The dust had a peculiar effect on the lungs and throat, causing irritation and hoarseness in some instances. Similar phenomena was witnessed here eight years ago.

THE Organization Committee of the Benevolent Irish Society formed a branch of that institution at County Line last evening. The meeting was large and enthusiastic, all present being in hearty sympathy with the movement. Stirring speeches were delivered during the evening by the members of the Committee and other gentlemen. The Society starts out under very favorable circumstances. It has a membership of over sixty—which it hopes to increase to a hundred at its next meeting—and an energetic staff of officers who are determined to make the Society a success. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded the Committee for their assistance in organizing, to which they suitably responded.

THE North Sydney Herald reports that an interesting breach of promise suit is in progress in Victoria, British Columbia. A dashing young man doing business in the Pacific city happened to get a photo of a young lady living in Nova Scotia, and became so infatuated with the picture that he entered into correspondence with the Bluenose young lady. Each letter received only helped to weld two hearts together. They became engaged. The young Victorian, determined that several thousand miles should not any longer keep two hearts apart, sent for his Bluenose lady love. The marriage was to immediately take place on her arrival at Victoria, but alas "There is many a slip between the cup and the lip." She arrived, but the gallant Victorian's love went down to zero at first sight and declared that the photo was not a true representation of the original. He refused to allow the knot to be tied, and now the fair one from Nova Scotia has demanded \$5,000 for damages done to her affections.
