THE PREMIER SOLD—The Halifax Herald says: The steamer Premier has been sold to Vigand & Co., Montreal, who own the steamer America, running between Halifax and the West Indies. The price is said to be £7,000; she was stocked at £12,000 when built a couple of years ago for the Nova Scotia east-coast trade.

CANADIAN HORSES IN NEW YORK—A sale at New York last week of Canadian half-bred hunters, saddlers and harness horses was well attended, many members of the pony racing association and hunt clubs being present. In the two days' sale 125 horses were sold. The total amount realized was \$58,950, an average of \$470.

SALVATION ARMY CHANGE—Ensign Watson of St. Stephen, N. B., is coming to the Island. Henceforth the work in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, P. E. Island and Newfoundland, known as the eastern provinces, will be directed from St. John, and not Toronto as formerly. Brigadier Jacobs will be the officer in charge with the title of provincial secretary.

WILL GET THE APPOINTMENT—Detective Power has been recommended to the city council of Halifax for chief of the police department. Detective Power has been on the force for nearly 30 years. He was a private 7 years, a sergeant 10 years, and detective for the balance. He has been connected with nearly all the criminal work in that city.

CONCRETE WALKS—The city engineer of Halifax, at a recent meeting of the board of works of that city, submitted a plan of the concrete sidewalks laid last year. The total cost was nearly \$10,000, and ran from \$2.07 to \$2.61 per square yard, not including granite curbing and gutters. Half the cost of the sidewalks are to be paid by property owners.

SCHOONER IN TROUBLE—The St. John Sun's Point du Chene correspondent writes: Schooner Charlie, Capt. Farroll, from Tignish, P. E. I., loaded with oats, when making the harbor on the 15th in a snow storm, with northeast wind blowing vigorously, ran into some drift ice, and could not force its way through. About 2 o'clock, a. m., it took ground on Point du Chene spit. The captain expects to get clear of the ground as soon as the weather moderates.
