The Presbytery.

At Charlottetown, and with the Hall
of St. James Church, on Tuesday,
the thirty-first day of March, one thousand
eight hundred and ninety-one, the
Presbytery of P. E. Island met and was
constituted with prayer by Rev. W. H.
Spencer, Moderator, with whom were
present Messrs. J. G. Cameron, W. P.
Archibald, A. R. Eaton, Jas. Carruthers,
G. McMillan, A. W. M. M. A. A. Mc-
Kenzie, W. M. Tuffa, R. C. Coffin, H.
Dickie, A. B. McLeod, L. Campbell, D.
Sutherland, J. M. McLeod, and J. M.
McLennan, ministers, with Messrs. Alex.
Robertson, T. Lowther, Tom. Jas. G. W.
J. M. Aitken and Wm. Laird, ruling
elders.
Took up the report of the committee
appointed to visit the congregations of
Murray Harbor, Woodville and Little
Sands. Before hearing the report the
clerk intimated that he had a petition
from Little Sands section of the congrega-
tion of Woodville and Little Sands,
requesting that the Presbytery visit pro-
ceedings until a fuller meeting of the con-
gregation be held; that the congregation
did not desire notice and as a result many
were unacquainted with the fact that a
meeting was being held. The Presbytery
having heard the petition, it was agreed
to continue the committee and instruct
them to arrange for a meeting in Wood-
ville and Little Sands at a time suitable
to all parties, and that the committee
report to the quarterly meeting to be held
in Summerside.
The clerk read the report of the com-
mittee visiting Caledonia and Valleyfield,
which was received and approved.
Mr. T. O. James read a report of the
committee visiting Georgetown and Mon-
trose, which set forth that at present no
arrangements for the future could be made.
The report was received and approved.
The Presbytery then took up reports of
standing committees. The clerk as
convener of the committee on statistics
read the annual report, which set forth
that the increase in the number of con-
gregational affairs was most encouraging,
that there are thirty-three congregations;
an increase in the past ten years of 6,
1881 families, 6010 communicants, and
4101 scholars in our Sabbath Schools.
The finances also showed a qualifying
increase; the amount paid by congrega-
tions alone being \$3,951, an increase
over last year of \$1197, and as compared
with ten years ago, an annual increase of
\$5000. It also set forth that the amount
contributed to schemes and benevolent
objects was \$2483, an increase over last
year of over \$560, and of \$4572 as com-
pared with 1880, thus showing that the
liberality of our people was doubled
during the past ten years. The total
contributions were given as \$44,434. The
report was received, and its recommenda-
tions considered and adopted.
The recommendations were as follows:
(a) That the Presbytery suggest to the
General Assembly's Committee on Sta-
tistics that a column be added to the
table under which may be given num-
bers of members who are in Montreal he was

breaking one of his ribs, from which he
has since entirely recovered.—Montreal
Gazette.

Dumont tells the Gazette some of His Plans for the Future.

Some days ago the waiting-rooms of the
Windsor street depot held a delegation of
citizens who, as a rule, are not seen in
railway stations. They were nearly all
old, gray-haired men, and they came at
that. From their appearance one would
say that these men had seen some kind
of military service during their long lives;
and the observer would be right. When
the "Soo" train arrived the object of
their visit was made known by Gabriel Dumont
of the late Louis Riel's regiment in the
Northwest rebellion, stepped from the
cars. He was greeted with cheers by the
waiting delegation. Mr. Dumont, after
shaking hands with those present, left
the depot in company with Mr. Charles
Page, with whom he will stop during his
stay in the city.
The Gazette had an interview later on
with the erstwhile leader of the rebellious
Northwest half-breeds, and was surprised
to see how well he is preserved, considering
the number of vicissitudes he has
gone through in his fifty-four years of
life. Mr. Dumont at the present time
weighs over two hundred pounds, stands
about six feet in his stocking feet and had
the appearance of a retired officer or high
ranked farmer. He was dressed in a busi-
ness suit, wearing a flannel shirt with
a sailor's neck shaped tie. His face is a
strong one and gives a visitor the impres-
sion that he is a man of very great
determination, and that when his mind is
set on any object he will carry it through.
In the course of the interview, which
was a pleasant one, Mr. Dumont was
asked what his plans were for the future.
Replying in French, which is the only
language he speaks, Mr. Dumont said
that he was going to meet a number
of capitalists who wished him to take a
Northwest show to the coming winter's
