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### Save Time As You Go!

The kitchen is really a busy place these days. Cleaning it up after a bout of cooking, baking and candy-making poses a problem, especially when there is so much else to do and so little time to do it.

#### USEFUL PAPER PLATES

This is one time when paper plates come in handy. Not for serving, for you'll want to use that fine company china. But put handy, disposable paper plates to work to lighten the load.

Before you start to bake or cook, spread paper plates around the kitchen in strategic spots to catch boisterous dripping spoons, the flour sifter, the egg beater, as well

as the dry ingredients, egg whites, nuts. At the end of the cooking session, out they go. Dish washing and mopping the cooking equipment has been cut to a minimum.

#### NOVEL DECORATIONS

Paper plates, we've found, make good decorations, too. We shellac them, color them and come up with some novel effects.

Decorate and string them on wire. Fasten them, garland fashion, against a wall with holly springs or leaves between each pair.

Cover them with foil or colorful metallic paper and use them as coasters under plants and flower containers. Wreath the edges with leaves.

### England's Puritans Banned Christmas As Frivolous Time

Christmas was outlawed in England by the Puritan Government of England in 1643 and, although the restoration of the Stuarts brought a revival of Christmas customs and traditions, Christmas never regained its former prestige in England.

It is observed religiously in the churches and as a day for family reunions and social gatherings, in contrast to the lavish feasting and boisterous merry-making of olden times.

Merry-making and gift-giving come in for their share, however, on December 26 which is Boxing Day. The origin of Boxing Day antedates Christmas and can be traced to the custom of the gift-giving during the Roman festival of Saturnalia.

In christian liturgy December 26 is observed as the feast of St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr, and during the centuries when

And reminiscent of the Roman Saturnalia, householders dine with the servants and, toward evening, there is revelling in the streets as groups of merry-makers gather on street corners or ride about London-town dancing on the "flats" of trucks.
