MORE DIFFERENCE

At the present time questions are appearing in the press relative to the financial arrangements existing between the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board and the Potato Industry Promotional Committee. It is not our intention to enter into the discussion on the merits of this working arrangement, but possibly some general information on the history and work of these two bodies might be timely.

In 1946 an Act was passed by the Provincial Legislature dealing with the control and eradication of certain potato diseases. This Act made provision for the collection of a levy in the amount of one per hundredweight on potatoes sold out of the province. These monies were collected through the Department of Agriculture and set up in a fund by the Government. In 1947 the Act was amended and the levy raised to 1c.

Under this Act the Government appointed a commission, it was the responsibility of the commission to assess disease situations and recommend compensations to the growers. Between 1946 and 1949 a number of growers received very substantial amounts of money in compensation for disabilities suffered through outbreaks of serious disease. From 1946 to March 31st, 1951, total of \$150,272.53 was paid under this fund with the high year being that ending March 31st, 1948 when over \$52,000 was the amount.

Following 1948 contributions dropped off rapidly to \$16,000 in 1950-51. There are probably a number of explanations for this decline but certainly one factor was the realization by potato dealers that the collection of the 1c levy could probably not be legally enforced.

ONTARIO TROUBLES

It should almost be unnecessary to state that genuine concern will be evident on the part of our citizens with respect to the very serious disaster inflicted upon the Toronto area of Ontario. The Winnipeg flood of 1950 was no flash flood, but rather a creeping paralysis which gave those in the area sufficient warning of the peril and resulted in only two deaths. The loss of life in Ontario was extremely high due to lack of warning of the rushing danger. Our farmers will perhaps better understand the plight of farmers on the Bradford Marsh, an area of intensive production which was only a great deal of hard work by people of Dutch extraction. This marsh covers an area of roughly 7,000 acres and has a population of 3,000 people all of whom were forced from their homes during the flood, even the beautiful Dutch Reform Church which rested up its window sills in this newly formed lake covering substantial quantities of unharvested crops.

This Province is singularly free from disasters of this nature and it is indeed rarely that nature inflicts any really serious damage upon us.

CATASTROPHE INSURANCE

The province of Ontario has a well developed Co-operative Medical Society which has done very worth while work on behalf of its members. In planning for 1955 the Society hopes to set up special provision for the members who might be the victims of protracted and expensive illnesses.

Briefly, the new plan aims to provide protection covering the second, third and possibly fourth and fifth thousand dollars of the expense incurred.

Early in 1949 the Potato Industry Promotional Committee was formed and had on its representatives from the Provincial Department of Agriculture, the Plant Protection Division and Inspection service of the Federal Government growers and dealers.

FRENCH GRAND CHAMPION

The French Agricultural Show in Paris has a very special class for champion dairy cows, the selection of these animals involves a very exhaustive analysis of all the factors which go to make up a really satisfactory animal. Forty points out of one hundred are allowed for milk and butter production covering a forty-two month period. Another forty points are allotted covering feed consumed, economy of production and regularity in breeding. Finally, twenty points are given for conformation and in this, the suitability of the animal for meat purposes is also considered.

This method of judging an animal would appear to be a fairly efficient manner of selecting the most valuable animals. A cow must also make efficient use of her feed and show the constitution to stand the heavy production. She must be good to look at and must also be a suitable type to bring a good return for meat when her career is finished.

LONDON (AP)—The advertisement read: "Wanted—mother No. 2. In about 18 months, according to doctors, mother No. 2 might become mother No. 1."

Mrs. Kathleen Ford, 42, explained Monday her husband, Jack, placed the ad in a shop window with her loving approval. Mrs. Ford has tuberculosis. Doctors give her 18 months to live.

"And," she said, "before I die I want to know there is someone to take my place as mother—and perhaps as wife."

While Mrs. Ford lies in a hospital bed, her husband looks after himself in their two-bedroom apartment. Sheila, their eight-year-old adopted daughter, has to live with foster parents.

"It's not much of a life for either Sheila or Jack," said Mrs. Ford. "Someone has to look after them. I can't—so why should I stand in the way of someone taking my place?"

Jack, a house decorator, said about three weeks ago my wife said I ought to find a woman to help in the home. Then a neighbor suggested the advertisement. I talked it over with Kathleen and she agreed. If I could get someone to be real mother to Sheila I would hope eventually to marry her.

"You see," he said, "I have already cried my tears for my wife."

Jam Upside-down Shortcakes

Combine 1 tbs. soft butter or margarine, 1/4 c. thick jam, 1 tbs. lemon juice and, if desired, 1/2 c. broken nutmeats and divide between 6 greased individual baking dishes. Mix and sift twice, then sift into a bowl, 1 1/2 c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 1 1/2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour), 3 tps. Magic Baking Powder, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. grated nutmeg and 1/4 c. fine granulated sugar. Cut in finely 5 tbs. chilled shortening. Combine 1 well-beaten egg, 1/2 c. milk and 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Make a well in dry ingredients and add liquids; mix lightly. Two-thirds fill prepared dishes with batter. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 375°, about 20 minutes. Turn out and serve hot with sauce or cream. Yield — 6 servings.
