late Bits Drop Cookies - Coffee or Tea, Milk.

CHOCOLATE BITS DROP COOKIES
1/2 c. room-soft butter or margarine
1/2 c. granulated sugar
7 tsp. browned sugar or 1/2 c. light brown sugar
1 large egg, well beaten
1 c. flour, sifted
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. baking soda
1/2 pkg. semi-sweet chocolate bits
1/2 tsp. vanilla
Stir butter until soft, work in sugars and egg. Sift together flour, cinnamon, salt and baking soda and gradually add to sugar mixture. Last, add chocolate bits and vanilla.
Drop by small teaspoonfuls onto oiled cookie sheet or a greased 9" square pan. Bake 10 min. in mod. oven, 375 degrees F.

Exciting Collection Ready For Gallery Auction Sat.

The finest item to be auctioned at the Confederation Centre Art Gallery on Saturday morning, May 15, by the Women's Committee is undoubtedly the Robert Harris self-portrait in oils and signed. Considering the growing interest in this island painter who is acclaimed as Canada's finest portraitist and whose works are the heart of the collections now hanging in the Gallery, the Women's Committee is most grateful to Robert Cotton, who donated the picture. They hope that the opportunity to buy a Harris painting, an event that will become rare as Canadian interest grows, will create the conditions of a successful auction. The painting will be auctioned sometime between 11.00 a.m. and noon. Considering the short time, three weeks, that the Committee had to find items for the auction, a most fascinating collection will be offered. There are several hundred items many of them of real interest to collectors. Among the many items that catch the eye are pieces of fine china, two soup tureens, a platter, a beautiful willow plate and cups. There is a silver vase, spoons and forks, a cream and sugar, brass candlesticks and canisters. Among the lovely glass pieces are a pair of cut glass decanters of exceptionally fine design with the much desired hollow stoppers, a candy casket and four quite modern glass stems. Of real interest to collectors of Canadiana is an early Nova Scotia hand-carved maple chair, a platform rocker, a foot stool and even a four-piece sofa set, late Victorian style. One un-

used contribution is an 80-year old hand-drawn and embroidered fine Irish linen bedspread which could quite easily be used as a tea cloth if you don't happen to have the type of four poster bed it was designed for. All the pieces are not antique or even very old. Some are as modern as a case for bowling shoes, an electric iron, a free form ashtray, and two pairs of boxing gloves, almost new. There will be a table where everything will be priced at fifty cents or a dollar.

On a table set aside for paintings and prints are several very attractive works by local artists, a pair of beautiful silk prints and a fine old set of hunting print - relief. Proceeds will be used for those projects which are of special interest to the Women's Committee: the setting up of a cultural fund for scholarships for talented students, for the purchase of special equipment for the Gallery and Museum and for the purchase of paintings and artifacts for the permanent collection; the setting up of the picture rental service, a program that will bring into the offices and homes of members of the Gallery the works of more than 100 of Canada's best artists on a loan basis for a minimum sum; the opening of a print shop where prints and slides of works from the Gallery, from the National Gallery and other great galleries will be available and where books of art and craft work can be purchased.

The auction, which the Women's Committee hopes will be an annual springtime occasion, will begin at 9.30 a.m. in the Gallery and will continue until all the items are sold. It will be open to the public without charge. The Committee members will be setting up the tables on Friday afternoon at which time the Gallery will be open to those who wish to preview the items to be sold.

Novel Beauty Luncheon An Attractive Trayful

AT this season, when the outdoors world looks fresh and lively, your friends will enjoy the novelty of a "beauty" luncheon.

You might highlight the spring affair with a flat "plaque-garden" arranged on a tray centering the luncheon table.

Dandelion Border
In the center, place short stalks of rhubarb with their yellow tips, bordered by green dandelion plants, with their yellow blossoms. Border the tray with large strawberries, a d and halves of 2 small pineapples, split lengthwise through the crown. Finish the edge of the tray with a border of sprigs of fresh mint or cress.

 - 2 With Radish Roses, Celery Sticks, Quartered Fresh Mushrooms
 - 3 Beauty Salad Plate

 - 6 Chilled Tea
 - 7 Measurements level (individual service)
 - 8 Beauty Salad Plate
 - 9 small, peeled, seeded cantaloupe
 - 10 mixed halved fresh strawberries, halved orange segments and pitted cherries
 - 11 lettuce or romaine leaves
 - 12 mixed snitzled (fine-shredded) fresh raw vegetables, including cabbage, carrots and beets
 - 13 each orange and grapefruit segments
 - 14 peeled banana
 - 15 hulled strawberries, additional
 - 16 Honey-lime dressing (optional)
- Center a chilled large plate with cantaloupe, fill with mixed fresh fruits. On one side, place lettuce or romaine leaves, put together to form a "boat"; fill with snitzled raw vegetables. Wreath the base of cantaloupe with orange and grapefruit segments, banana and hulled strawberries. Serve dressing in small paper cup on plate.
- Honey - Lime Dressing:** Beat together 1/2 c. strained honey and 2 tsp. lime juice; fold in 1 beaten egg white just before serving. Enough dressing for 8.

PINEAPPLE JULEP - STYLE

- 1 1/2 tsp. strained honey
- 1 tsp. lemon juice
- 1 c. orange juice
- 6 springs fresh mint

Combine pineapple, honey and fruit juices, chill. Transfer to individual sherbet glasses. Top each serving with sprig of mint.
