Eight Canadians Are Named To Adjudicate DDF Regionals

John F. Brook of Simcoe, Ont., national president of the Dominion Drama Festival, has announced that eight Canadians will adjudicate DDF's 14 regional festivals to be held in March and April.

Three of these have adjudicated previous DDF competitions. They are: Andrew Allan of Toronto, well known radio and television producer, director and actor; Walter Massey of Montreal, actor and director.

In making the announcement, Mr. Brook welcomed five theatre personalities as new adjudicators. They are: Charlotte Boisjoli of Montreal, actress and director; Monique LePage of Montreal, actress and theatre manager; Paul Blouin of Montreal, actor, director and television producer; Lawrence Sabbath of Montreal, lecturer and Montreal Star drama critic; Dennis Sweeting of Toronto, actor, director and drama critic.

For festival purposes, Canada has been divided into 14 regions which are grouped into eight zones. The winning play of each zone will be invited to compete in the final festival for the DDF national trophy and a cash prize of \$1,000.

Eight-Year Veteran Schurman Runs Again

SUMMERSIDE — An eight-year veteran of civic affairs, Herbert Schurman, last night officially announced his candidacy in the forthcoming civil election here Feb. 23.

Mr. Schurman will contest the East Ward seat being vacated by D. Alex MacDonald who is not re-offering due to pressure of business.

In announcing his candidacy Mr. Schurman stated he had been interested in town affairs for the past 23 years, having first entered civic politics in 1942 and elected for the first time in 1946.

From 1946 to 1952 he served continuously on the council, first under Mayor Frank J. Arnett, now deceased, and then under Hon. Henry Wedge.

Mr. Schurman retired from civic politics in 1959 but returned 10 years later to gain a seat on the council under Mayor J. Ernest Morrison. He contested the seat again in 1964 but was defeated by Grant Molson.

Last night Mr. Schurman stated "the only reason I am coming out is due to the fact that Councillor MacDonald is not re-offering again". He added that requests of many citizens in the town in general to "come out" had helped him make this decision.

The former councillor said he had no axe to grind and felt that his eight years experience in civic affairs would enable him to give assistance to the present mayor and council in the town's operations.

Mr. Schurman is the second person to announce his candidacy in the forthcoming election. Earlier this week J. Ernest Morrison announced he would contest the Center Ward seat being vacated by Garnet Ross.

Councillor Leo Wood indicated some time ago that he would offer for another two-year term in the West Ward. Rumors have been circulating that Clarence "Windy" Steele, a former councillor, will oppose Councillor Wood in this ward. Mr. Steele, however, has been non-committal.
