Refreshments were served by Mrs. Sterling Stewart and Mrs. Ernest MacNeill assisted by the hostess.

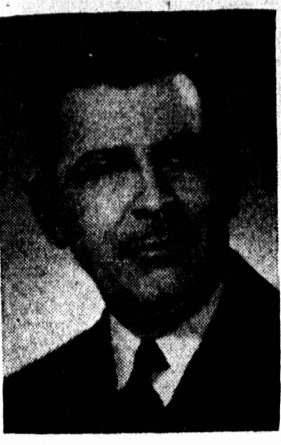

T.B. Still Kills 3,400 Yearly In Canada.

"The lowest tuberculosis death rate in our history" has come to be the expected annual comment on statistics concerning tuberculosis in Canada observes the Canadian Tuberculosis Association.

It would be unfortunate also if the falling death rate masked the fact that TB keeps at least 30,000 Canadians too ill to work, at any given time, with all the unhappiness, inconvenience and loss of wages accompanying enforced idleness of a year, perhaps two years or even longer.

Early diagnosis, prompt treatment, daring surgery and new drugs have all contributed to the steady decline in the death rate from TB but despite this it is the leading cause of death in the 15 to 45 age group.

The death rate has halved in the last ten years but until the decline in the appearance of new cases matches the dropping death rate it is premature for Canadians to think tuberculosis is beaten.

Last year 117 active BT cases were found in P. E. I. Last year another 22 people died of TB in P. E. I. Yet tuberculosis is a preventable disease.

It is not hereditary. Every new case is caused by germs from another case. It develops slowly and may cause lung damage before a person feels sick.

It is important to find TB early. X-ray helps. The Mobile Unit takes chest X-rays free of charge. It is the duty of everyone from 5 to 90 years to be X-rayed every two years.
