MINISTERS IN ST. JOHN!

GRAND POLITICAL DEMONSTRATION.

Enthusiasm and Popular Applause.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 14.

The mass meeting in the Lansdowne Rink last night, was one of the largest and enthusiastic political gatherings ever held in St. John. The meeting was held under the auspices of the Young Men's Liberal Conservative Club. On the tastefully decorated platform were Hon. Thos. White, Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Hon. J. S. D. Thompson, Hon. Senator Boyd, T. E. Barker, M. P., C. A. Everett, M. P., Josiah Wood, M. P., and others. W. H. Thorne acted as Chairman.

The first speaker, Dr. F. E. Barker, M. P., on rising to speak was received with long and continued applause. After a short speech, in which he was frequently interrupted by loud applause, he was followed by C. A. Everett, M. P., who was received with great cheering.

Next came Hon. Thos. White, Minister of the Interior, who was loudly and enthusiastically received.

All questions pertaining to the North-west, to the Fisheries and to the Administration of Justice with regard to Riel were subjects on which White Foster and Thompson are officially connected. The departments have been managed by good men in the past, but never by Ministers better able to give an account of themselves than the speakers of last night.

Troubles and Dangers of Fishery Officers.

ST. ANDREW'S, N. B., Oct. 13.

Fishery overseer Campbell got a boat from the Middleton in charge of first officer Pratt, and put off about eight o'clock to where a large number of fishermen were herring driving, most of whom used kerosene torches. As the boat started a shot was fired by some party on the wharf as a signal that the Middleton's boat had started, which caused the torch burners to extinguish their torches. As the Middleton's boat was returning a shot was fired at her from a boat near the Island bar. The ball struck the water on the star-board side of the boat.

Accidentally Killed.

WOODSTOCK, N. B., Oct. 13.

An old man named John Baptiste Thibedeau was accidentally killed by a special train near here to-day. An inquest was held on the body of Thibedeau, and a verdict of accidental death returned, attaching no blame to anyone.
