Local and Other Items

LOBSTER COMMISSION.—It is understood that the lobster commission is to hold a session at Summer side on the 3rd December and another at Ermont Bay on the 4th. The meetings will be held at 3 and 7 o'clock each evening.

ARCHBISHOP WALSH'S WILL.—The will of Archbishop Walsh, of Toronto, contains the following legacies: Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation of London, \$1,000, St. Joseph's Orphan Asylum, Mount Hope, London, \$1,000; Roman Catholic hospital at Windsor, \$500; for Masses, \$500; his nephew, John Moylan, \$500. All the residue of his estate of every kind to his successor as Archbishop of Toronto. The estate is inventoried at \$9,581.53.

INTER-PROVINCIAL HOCKEY.—There has been considerable talk of late as to an inter-provincial hockey league, and the Amherst club has decided to hold a meeting at Amherst on the 30th inst., at 8 p. m., at the Terrace hotel, and each club in the provinces is asked to send a delegate, whose expenses the Amherst team will pay while there, the club sending him only having to pay his travelling expenses. The Amherst team desire clubs to advise them at once through their secretary, J. R. Douglas, whether or not the club will be represented.

THE UNEXPECTED HAPPENS.—One of the surprises of the recent election, says the New York Sun, was the choice in Winnebago county, Ill., of a Prohibitionist to the Legislature. It is the first time in the history of that State that a Prohibitionist legislative candidate has won. Winnebago county is usually Republican, and by a very large majority. It is one of the six counties of Illinois which are on the Wisconsin boundary, and it includes the city of Rockford, in which the Prohibition candidate for President polled 118 votes in 1895. A Prohibitionist in the Springfield Legislature, as a representative in the State which has the largest distillery, is a new thing. The candidate's name is Regan.

UNCLE SAM'S ARMY.—Major-General Nelson A. Miles has submitted to his department at Washington a report covering the operations of the United States army during the past year. It is a bulky document, covering campaigns in Cuba, Porto Rico and the Philippines. General Miles points out that the weapons of war are constantly changing and improving, and that the army should keep pace with them. He recommends an increase of the regular forces in the proportion of one soldier to every thousand of the population. He also recommends Congress to authorize an auxiliary force of national troops, to be clothed by United States army men, for service in Porto Rico, Cuba and the Philippines—the proportion in this case being two soldiers to every thousand of the population. This force would be used in a way similar to the Mounted Police in Canada and the British force in Egypt and India.

Houses in Mexico.

The principal reason that houses cannot be built rapidly in Mexico is that the walls are always made very thick in order to withstand the occasional earthquake shocks. In the thin walls usually put up in the United States the mortar will readily dry and "set" after the wall is erected, but here, where walls are made anywhere from 2 or 3 to 6 feet thick, they must be allowed to dry thoroughly as they are built, or serious consequences result from the drying of the outer edge while the center is still "green." Thus it is that one sees the walls all over a new building in different stages of completion, and it is often a curious sight to see thin interior walls completed to a point much higher than the thick outside walls.—Modern Mexico.
