Because of dissatisfaction with our 30 mile speed zones in past years, the R.C.M.P. were asked to make detailed recommendations for the improvement of traffic control.

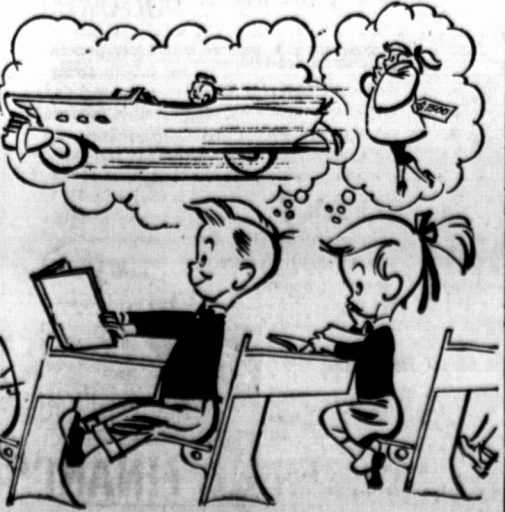
Their recommendations have now been received and Highway sign crews have been instructed to follow them out. Crews are now at work placing 30 and 40 MPH signs as recommended.
