ACCOMMODATIONS IN DEMAND

Thousands Of Tourists Are Flocking To Province

Tourist by the thousands have flocked to Prince Edward Island and cabin operators are all unanimous that this is the best year ever. They estimate it to be anywhere from 10 to 25 per cent over last year.

The Tourist Bureau located in the YMCA Building in Charlottetown reports its staff is extremely busy answering inquiries. The bureau says its staff at the joint operated information centre at Aulac, N.B. reports "a terrific crush" of tourists seeking information about the Island.

Proprietors of motels in the Charlottetown area say they have been filled every night for weeks and it is only natural that the home of the first citizen, William Martin, Valleyfield, should have been selected as the first meeting house. In 1842 a log meeting house was built.

A frame church was built in 1845 and enlarged in 1847 to accommodate the growing congregation. A new large church was built and opened for worship in 1855. The present church was built and opened for divine service on December 26th, 1909.

Under Construction
National Park camping areas at Stanhope and Brackley have been jammed with tents, but the superintendent says there always seems to be "room for one more" tent when the necessity arises. He points out that the Cavendish camping area is under construction at the present time, but even this inconvenience doesn't seem to bother the campers.

The trailer park at Stanhope is filled and the privately operated trailer park near the National Park site is also reported doing very well.

From the Summerside area motel and cabin operators are all unanimous that this is the best year ever. They estimate it to be anywhere from 10 to 25 per cent over last year.

The same condition applies at other places in O'Leary area and cabins at Fortune Cove.

Even the Eastern section of the province is feeling the influx of tourists this year, although not as great as in the other sections of the Island.

The report from Souris indicates that the owner of a new motel which is still under construction is already turning away tourists and has a ready rental for the accommodations which he has available.

ROOM FOR CAMPERS
In the Montague district all accommodations are filled to capacity and indications are there is a shortage. However there are still ample tenting and camping facilities in the beautiful Montague River and Bay area which are not being used, mostly through lack of advertising and promotion.

So far more than 800 have registered at the Garden of the Gulf Museum since June 28th with the majority of visitors being from Massachusetts, other American states and Canadian provinces. There are even some registering from Peru and Scotland. However many visitors to the museum do not take time to register.

However the general impression of the P. E. I. Tourist Bureau is receiving is that the present accommodations are not enough for all the many thousands who wish to visit the province this summer.

Borden Resident Said 'Not Guilty'

SUMMERSIDE—A resident of Borden was released from custody in which he had been held for the past six weeks when he appeared in Summerside Magistrate's court yesterday morning.

The Borden resident is charged with breaking into the Borden Legion on the night of June 14. In declaring the man not guilty Magistrate R. S. Hinton, stated that there was no supporting evidence for the crown witness who testified against the accused and who admittedly had been drinking on the day of the alleged break.

Valleyfield United Church To Mark 119th Anniversary

VALLEYFIELD — Valleyfield United Church will celebrate its 119th anniversary tomorrow. The special speaker at both services will be the Rev. T. E. McLennan D.D., of St. Andrew's United Church, Truro, N.S.

The Valleyfield congregation, one of the oldest in the province has a history of intense interest. The first settlers in the Valleyfield district were immigrants from the Highlands of Scotland.

In the early days the Valleyfield pastoral district comprised the following communities, Valleyfield, 1794; settled 1840; Heatherdale, 1841; Lyndale, 1829; Grandview and Bellevue, 1838; Caledonia, 1858; St. Mary's Road, Whim Road, Kilmuir, Head of Montague, Victoria Cross, Dundas, Commercial Cross.

The spiritual needs of the new settlement became the early concern of the people. In 1841, prayer meetings were organized. Each man in the district took his turn as leader.

Piper MacLaren then played "The Road To The Isles", and Mr. Steeves pronounced the benediction.

A short business meeting was held after which all returned to the picnic site on the main island where they were entertained with Scottish dancers by Helen-Melish of Charlottetown. The usual picnic, lunch and friendly conversation were enjoyed.

Some visitors and tourists were welcome guests and all were particularly pleased to see Wilbur MacLaren of British Columbia, formerly of Brudenell, who is visiting his brother, Henry at Charlottetown.
