Let us then be up and doing, Striving for an honored place; Safe within the hallowed circle Of our Saviour's fond embrace. IN MEMORIAM. Captain Nelson E. Cantelo, of Dundas, King's County, P. E. Island, master of the schooner Spenser F. Baird, of Gloucester, Mass., and his gallant crew of fourteen men who were lost on the night of Dec. 20th, at White Islands, N. S. The Spenser F. Baird left the port of Gloucester, Nov. 25, 1893, on a George's trip under command of Captain Nelson Cantelo, and had a crew of fourteen men—being fitted for a six weeks trip. The vessel put in at Canaan, Dec. 8, and on the following day took bait and sailed. The last tidings received from the vessel was a letter from Captain Cantelo. In this he said that fish were very plentiful on the banks, but that bait was very scarce and that he had decided to take out a fishing license in Nova Scotia to secure baiting privileges, which they did, at a cost of \$120. A pleasing feature of this letter, which shows the harmonious relations existing between master and crew, was the postscript stating that he had one of the very best crews he ever had during his experience as master. This was the last heard of the Spenser F. Baird and her noble crew, till the sea at last gave some evidence of the doomed vessel—papers floated ashore and from which the obliterating effects of the salt water have not removed the traces of identification. Fears changed to certainty as the telegraphic despatch of the wreck reached the coast. The shipping articles of the craft had the crew list thereon, as follows: Nelson E. Cantelo, master, Charles Leary, Delbert Goodwin, Alex. Lamson, Alex. Williams, A. E. Martell, Patrick Hayden, Thomas Fevers, Patrick Howlett, Chas. W. Leno, Daniel McDonald (steward), John T. White, Leslie Hipson, fourteen good men and true, who have sailed out beyond Eastern Point for the last time. As far as can be learned, seven were married, and this disaster causes six widows and five fatherless children. Some of the newspapers deplored the policy of the Captain's keeping in-shore in a gale, and wondered if it were possible that the master of the Baird could possibly do this in the face of his long experience as master. But the sequel, which is terribly sad, shows that this was not the case. Nelson E. Cantelo, master of the Spenser F. Baird, was a native of Dundas, in this Island, and a son of the late James Cantelo. He left his home at Dundas this March twelve months and then went to Gloucester and commanded the schooner Herbert M. Rogers, in the mackerel fishery. The Gloucester Times says: "Capt. Cantelo was well and favorably known hereabouts, his open nature, and genial temperament making him a favorite with those who sincerely mourn his sad fate. He was one of the ablest navigators, that left the port of Gloucester, and was a credit to the name of the 'Baird'." By letters received from his brother, the body of the captain, by all marks of identification, has been washed ashore and decently interred. But the sore hearts of his friends here have been made sorer, by the latest news of "man's inhumanity to man" which, if true, is almost terrible enough to chill the blood in one's veins and we have no doubt a severe investigation will be instituted. The Saint John News-Tribune Daily News says: "The master of the 'Baird', now in port, gives a remarkable account of his trip at White Islands about 60 miles east of Halifax. It appears from a letter Captain Rowe has received from his wife, who lives only 18 miles from the scene of the tragedy, that a man named Berrigan, in order to decoy vessels ashore for the purpose of plunder, placed a light on a pole on a rock called White Island (a ledge running several miles out to sea), so as to mislead vessels into taking it for a light called Liscomb Light, and thus cause their destruction. The American schooner Spenser F. Baird, of Gloucester, is said to have taken those false lights as intended, with the result that she went ashore on Boundary Rock and became a total wreck, all hands being lost. One Newfoundland, Thos. Fevers, brother of the master of the Commonwealth, was a member of the crew of the Spenser F. Baird. "Our heartfelt sympathies go out to all the bereaved ones, and may He who alone can give consolation to the wounded hearts, give them the assurance of meeting in that land where there will be no more parting.
