

# Premier Attends Summerside Meeting

SUMMERSIDE — Two plans were approved as possible interchanges at Albany, at a meeting of Provincial and Civic leaders at Summerside yesterday afternoon.

Premier Alex Campbell told the meeting that what the Government wanted was an expression of opinion, and that the opinion would be talked over with Northumberland Consultants and the Federal Department of Public Works, before a final decision would be forthcoming.

He said that the traffic system to be employed at the Albany intersection had received approval in principle from Ottawa and that tenders would be called by early or mid-spring for construction.

A traffic circle (plan number two) received some support. Premier Campbell said he was satisfied with the meeting, and that the choice had been narrowed down. He said that negotiations would now be held with Northumberland Consultants and the Federal Department of Public Works.

He said that the most efficient and safest traffic system would be employed.

Mr. White commented on the Read's Corner pattern and stated that he hoped it would be better when it was finished. Mr. MacQuarrie of the Summerside Board of Trade, stated that a yield sign from Kensington at this point was not effective; a stop sign was necessary.

# Heavy Docket At Georgetown

GEORGETOWN — Provincial Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, held court in Georgetown yesterday.

John Michael McCarthy, St. Mary's Road, was fined \$35 and costs when he elected trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty to a charge of unlawfully and forcibly entering a dwelling house.

Raymond George McQuillan, Georgetown, pleaded guilty to a charge of impaired driving and was fined \$100 and costs or 15 days.

On the attempted theft charge he pleaded guilty and on the break, entry, and theft charge he elected trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty. The accused was remanded in custody until January 5 for sentence.

Carl David Nicholson, Montague, charged with break, entry and theft of liquor and cigarettes valued at \$49.25 at the Canadian Legion Home, Montague, and also charged with breaking and entering the Montague Cycling Club and theft of a small quantity of liquor.

## RCMP Release Grim Statistics

SUMMERSIDE — Sergeant Macdonald of the Summerside Detachment RCMP released grim statistics for Prince County Wednesday.

He said in a year-end compilation that 15 people were killed as the result of 19 motor vehicle accidents. This compares to an overall total of 22 killed in 25 accidents.

There were 526 motor vehicle accidents in the country, with 1,248 highway traffic prosecutions laid and 168 charged with impaired driving.

The statistics included the three RCMP detachments in the country of Alberton, Summerside, and Borden, and were up to midnight Wednesday. Not included in the statistics were Summerside town, and other towns and villages that are policed by those other than RCMP.

"Especially is this true in the case of the boarded-in rinks, which will be situated on the Spring Park playground site, and the area bordering on Gay Ave., Summer Street," said Mr. Fox.

co-operation will be forthcoming in both the usage of skating and hockey rinks, as well as assistance in the voluntary clearing of light snowfalls.

Both of these areas will have an adult-size, 184 ft. x 90 ft. ice surface, including goal frames and nets, which will prove valuable for hockey. Since we do expect to have skating, as well as hockey, enjoyed, it is hoped that interested parents and adults will volunteer necessary assistance in seeing that the greatest number of children are able to enjoy these facilities.

Other rink sites presently listed by the Recreation Department are: Co-Op playground development, Queen Charlottetown High School, St. Jean School, Birchwood High School, West Kent School, Kinsmen Playground (DesBrisay Crescent), corner of Kent Street and Cumberland Street (rear of the Vocational School), Kelly Lot (Dorchester Street), Lot west of Queen Charlotte, Armouries on Water Street.

As soon as the weather permits, the rinks will be open for public usage, and Mr. Fox points out that arrangements have been completed that will see all mentioned ice surfaces cleared of snow within 24 hours following each storm.
