South Koreans
Fear Tanks And
People's Court

ALONG HAN RIVER DEFENCE
LINE OUTSIDE SEOUL, June 29-
(Delayed) - (AP) - The poorly
equipped South Korean defenders
have two fears - Russian-made
tanks and the Reds' people's court
in Seoul.

Claim Russia Will
Avoid War In Korea

BERLIN, July 2-(AP) - Soviet
propagandists told jittery Eastern
Europe Saturday that Russia will
avoid open entanglement in the
Korean war.

Col. Lee Yong Kyu, if the South
Koreans-as organized and equip-
ped at the time-can retake Seoul.

"Too late," he sighed.
Before the Southern defenders
can start on an offensive, said the
Korean general, his troops must
have air power, tanks, heavy ar-
tillery and engineers.

Motorcycle accidents claimed the
lives of Martin Sado, Jr. near Sar-
dis, B.C., and Garfield Keller at
Napawee, Ont.

Leonard Kucharski, 17, of Van
Dyke, Mich., died when his car
hit a hydro pole near Hagersville,
Ont. At Belleville, Ont. John V.
Finkle, 20, was killed when his
truck went out of control and hit
an abutment.

An unidentified man died in the
east-end Pointe Aux Trembles area
of Montreal in a head-on automo-
bile collision.

A Vancouver man, Don Barbara,

Jr., was fatally injured when he
was struck by a truck on the high-
way near West St. Paul, Man. while
hitch-hiking. Forty-five-year-old
Robert Swan died in Hamilton af-
ter he was struck by a car.

Edward Williams, 65, was drown-
ed while swimming in the Credit
River near Toronto.

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
