

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Special dispatch to Examiner.

LONDON, Jan. 26.

John Bright, in a speech at Birmingham, on Saturday, suggested that Parliament should appoint a Commission to go to Dublin with power to sell the farms of landlords to tenants willing to buy them, and to advance three-fourths of the purchase money—the principal and interest to be paid in 35 years. Such a measure, Mr. Bright believed, would meet the wants and satisfy the desires of the Irish.

A Dublin despatch to the *Globe* says it is now generally believed that the Government intend to proceed at once with the prosecution of Davitt, Daly, Killen and Brennan, for sedition. The *Pall Mall Gazette* says that the trial of the *Red Bull* cases will not take place before the beginning of February.

OTTAWA, Jan. 26.

Mr. Lowe, Secretary for the Department of Agriculture, has arrived from Great Britain; he had been attending the meetings held by the farmer delegates.

The rumored resignation of the Hon. R. D. Wilmot as President of the Senate and a member of the Government, is confirmed. It is rumored that political differences exist between him and the Government.

THE *Patriot* complains that the Mic-Mac Indians in this Province are not now fairly dealt with. It is said that their usual supply of blankets, provisions, etc., are not forthcoming, and that great distress prevails among them in consequence. The *Patriot* also finds fault with the present Commissioner, or "resident teacher." It will be remembered that the Mackenzie Government dismissed Mr. Theophilus Stewart from his position as Indian Commissioner, and appointed in his stead the present incumbent. Of the present Commissioner's fitness for the position we know very little, except what we learn from the *Patriot*. But Mr. Stewart was a man who had made the wants and habits of the Indians a study. He devoted all his time and energies to locking after them, and endeavoring to improve their condition socially and intellectually. During the time he held office, little or no complaint was ever heard against him; but he was dismissed from his position by the late Government, to make room for a political favorite whom the *Patriot* now insinuates is unfit for the position. As we before stated, we know very little about the competency of the present Indian Commissioner, but when the organ of the party which placed him in power is the first to find fault, it looks as if there was something wrong.—*Progress*.

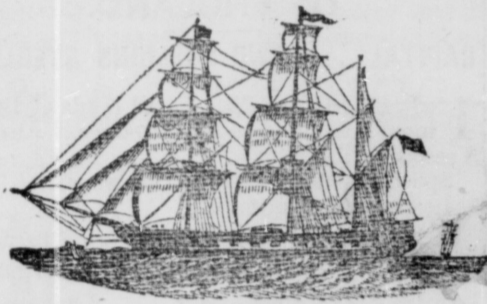
