

# White Sox Win Two; Yanks And All NL Teams Split

The Chicago White Sox padded their American League lead to three games by sweeping a pair from Cleveland Thursday while the New York Yankees split their two at Washington. But in the National League, the Memorial Day doubleheaders were played on a treadmill, with all four divided to leave the Cincinnati Reds 1 1/2 games ahead of Brooklyn and two decisive runs as the White Sox defeated Milwaukee.

Billy Pierce pitched a dandy three-hitter and singled home the decisive run as the White Sox defeated the Indians 2-1 in the nightcap after starting the Tribe on their fall to third place with a 6-4 decision in the opener.

The Yankees hustled back to beat Washington 9-0 after the Senators had stretched their winning streak to four games 5-1. The Detroit Tigers took two from Kansas City, 6-5 in 10 innings and 3-2; and the Boston Red Sox beat Baltimore twice, 7-5 in 10 and 16-5.

**BALTHY HITS**  
Cincinnati rallied for four seventh-inning runs on homers by Gus Bell and Frank Robinson to beat St. Louis in the second game 7-3. The Cards, with Wally Moon extending his hit streak to 23

games through the twin bill, won the opener 7-2.  
Brooklyn beat Pittsburgh 4-3, then lost 2-1. Milwaukee defeated Chicago 5-2, but lost the second game to the Cubs 4-2. Philadelphia, still in fourth place three games behind, defeated New York 2-1 in 10 innings, but the Giants took the nightcap 8-1 with Willie Mays' hitting streak reaching 18 games.

Pierce, who struck out nine while winning his eighth, gave up his first run in 20 innings with a walk and George Strickland's triple that gave the Indians a 1-1 tie in the fifth. But Billy put away with a single in the Sox fifth after two errors and an intentional walk had loaded the bases against loser Mike Garcia.

Dick Donovan checked the Indians in the opener, although allowing two hits before he was walked nine and drove in three runs.

**PASCUAL NICKED**  
Camilo Pascual, who had been winless in 10 decisions against the Yankees, finally made it, allowing only two hits before he was struck on the right arm by loser Al Cioetto's liner and had to leave in a two-run third, set up by Gerry Coleman's two errors, that did it. Bobby Shantz won his fifth with a five-hitter and drove in two

runs while stopping the Senator in the second game.  
The Tigers, who were 0-6 against the Sox, swept the three-game series with relief pitcher Lou Sleater hitting his first major league home run in his five-year career to win the opener. Frank Bolling tagged a pair of home runs in the second game for the Tigers, who won it on a throwing error by Vic Power, a first baseman playing right field for the injured Harry Simpson.

Jackie Jensen hit two home runs, the first winning the opener, drove in four runs and scored six in the Red Sox' sweep, which counted a total of 54 hits by the two clubs. Billy Klaus and Jim Piersall also slugged two-run homers in the second game.

**HELD TO FOUR**  
Willard Schmidt held the Red Sox to four hits to win his fourth for the Cards, who bagged it with three in the fourth—two on Al Dark's triple—against loser Joe Nuxhall. George Crowe and Ed Bailey also homered for the Red Sox in the second game, but it was the only center where he will make an appearance on Prince Edward Island.

It was Simmons' 100th victory since he was signed as a \$60,000 bonus southpaw 10 years ago.

Rookie Curt Barclay then cut down the Phils with a four-hitter in his first complete game. Mays had a two-run, inside-the-park homer in the first inning.

# Sam Hanks Gets Victory In Indianapolis 500

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Sam Hanks, the lean "dean" of race drivers, won his first Indianapolis 500-mile auto race in 12 tries Wednesday, throttling his horizontal-engine yellow car to a record-smashing triumph.

Hanks, 42, from Pacific Palisades, Calif., gunned his light-weight Belong Special, which has its engine lying on its side, at 135.601 miles an hour average over the 200 laps.  
The six-foot, 160-pound driver, who last year finished second to Pat Flaherty, cracked the 1954 record of 130.840 miles an hour by the late Bill Vukovich.

Hanks finished 17 1/2 seconds ahead of 28-year-old Jim Rathmann of Miami, who came up from the last row in the 11-row starting lineup to challenge Hanks the entire second half of the thrilling race. Cigar-chomping Jimmy Bryan from Phoenix, Ariz., was third.

**17 SURVIVORS**  
Fourth among the 17 surviving cars of the original field of 33 was the Novi special of Paul Russo, 43, Canoga Park, Calif., while fifth went to Andy Linden of Indianapolis.  
In ideal weather, the crowd of more than 150,000 saw the yellow caution light flash on four

Another favorite, veteran Freddie Agabashian, veteran Fred Agabashian of Walnut Creek, Calif., who ran three times during the first half, was forced out when fire enveloped his car during a pit stop shortly past the 250-mile mark. Agabashian's fuel line broke while he was entering the pits, but he got out of his car without injury.  
Hanks had placed third in 1952 and 1953. He got within 20 seconds of the winner last year, finishing third behind Pat Flaherty, who was sidelined this year by injuries suffered in a near-fatal crash at Springfield, Ill., last summer.

**U. C. Doesn't Oppose Sunday Sports As Such**  
VANCOUVER (CP) — Rt. Rev. James Thomson of Montreal, moderator of the United Church of Canada, said Thursday the church does not oppose Sunday sport as long as it is not commercialized.

"I stand by my statement that Sunday should be a day of enjoyment," he said in an interview. "But the church does not wish to see Sunday sport become a commercialized institution."  
"No intelligent Christian person can object to baseball or any other means of people enjoying themselves on Sunday."

He said, however, that it is important "we preserve all that is good and worthwhile in the tradition of having one day a week different from the others."

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# Yvon Durelle KO's Wallace

MONCTON (CP) — A grim Yvon Durelle knocked out Gordie Wallace of Montreal, Ont., here Thursday night in 2:17 of the second round of a 12-round bout to retain his Canadian light-heavyweight crown.

The Bale Ste. Anne, N.B. fisherman, 174, set up Wallace, 166, with a left hook and finished him with a savage right uppercut. Earlier in the second, Durelle put Wallace down for a seven count. His eye streaming blood, the British Empire light-heavyweight champion lay flat on his back on the canvas for about two minutes.

His title wasn't at stake.  
He was nearly forgotten in the rush to Durelle's corner by wildly partisan fans, many of them crewmen in the stoney-faced fisherman's fleet of four ships.

Durelle, who has won five of six bouts in 1957, now is scheduled to face Tony Anthony, No. 1 contender for Archie Moore's world title, at Detroit June 14. Anthony kayoed Wallace in one round at New York last December.
