To the Editor of the Journal.

The rapid growth of the rising town of Summerside, during the past few years, is really astonishing. Buildings have been erected in almost all parts of it, and what was only a year or two ago looked upon as "out of the town," is now dotted with houses, and can boast of the only public building in Summerside.

That no truckman, laborer, or other person, whatsoever, shall hereafter do or perform any labor, work or business appertaining to his or their respective ordinary callings or professions, or other worldly labor, or suffer the same to be done &c., (works of charity and necessity only excepted).

Now, sir, that this law is put in operation by some parties in this place, who go to their daily work on this day, is a fact well known to many persons; and, I believe, to some who have the power to bring such parties before a tribunal and prevent them from so doing.

I trust that there will be a revelation of this fact to the Grand Jury at its next sitting in this County, and that such matters that call loudly for redress will receive attention.

London, Jan. 29th. France is disgusted with recent measures put forward by the Emperor.—Canadian railway loan four million pounds etc., guaranteed by Government soon.—Formidable bread riot in Greenwich.—Lord Derby reported seriously ill.

Cape Traverse, 23. Couriers arrived this side at five o'clock.—Boat that left this side returned—too much lolly.

Gold 34. Paris, Jan. 21. Monitor-to-day says the Government is anxious to explain to the French Government its foreign policy, and will accept any questions on the subject at the opening of the Session which will be substituted for the usual debate upon the address.

London, Jan. 22. The Herald of this morning editorially says that the Government has protested against the decision of Spain in the Tornado case owing to irregularity.

The Herald admits that the operations of the Tornado look suspicious. Florence, Jan. 22. The question between Italy and Turkey arising out of firing upon an Italian vessel by Turks has been amicably settled. The Sublime Porte yields every point, and consents to any indemnity.

Athens, Jan. 22. The chief of the insurgents in Candia has written a long letter to the U. S. Consul here thanking the American people through him for the sympathy extended to the Cretans. He also petitions the Consul for American ships of war to convey the women and children away.

London, Jan. 22. The Court of Admiralty has just given final judgment in favor of the United States in the Rappahannock case. This makes the third steamer recovered by the United States Consul Dudley, in the Courts here. Gold (N. Y.) 34 1/4.
