Laotian Neutrality

Already there has been an ominous gesture from the new Laotian coalition government. The other day it called for the withdrawal of United States troops from neighboring Thailand as "a threat to the neutrality of Laos." A government spokesman made this statement to 25 Communist-bloc reporters after the new cabinet's first meeting.

Laos has been under the protective watch of the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO) since the organization was founded in 1954. It was under the alliance's charter that President Kennedy sent 5,000 troops to Thailand last month. The new Laotian premier, Prince Souvanna Phouma, announced at his installation that under his policy the country would no longer recognize the protection of SEATO.

For the immediate future the big question in Laos is integration of the armed forces of the three factions and departure of the 10,000 North Vietnamese Communist troops that have fought on the side of the Pathet Lao. All foreign troops would be required to leave within seventy-five days after signing the final accord at Geneva.

Once military and civil integration is complete, the question of elections would arise. The danger for the West lies in the fact that the Communists now control most of the country and presumably have been working to put themselves in a strong political position. In the circumstances, it is unlikely that the U.S. troops in Thailand will be withdrawn immediately. They are there, not as a threat to Laotian neutrality, but to ensure that its neutrality will not be short-lived.

A Grand Smash-Up

Scientists from Britain's egg marketing board recently went on a tremendous egg-smashing spree. Some four thousand eggs were smashed deliberately, but not just for the fun of it. The scientists were trying to find out whether egg quality varied from one breed of chicken to another, just as milk varies with the breed of cow. They were wanted to find out whether the drive for more and cheaper eggs was lowering quality.

Each egg was tested for color, protein value and shell thickness. Each was weighed and checked for faults, and a micrometer gauge measured how much thick jelly-like substance there was near the yolk where the maximum food value lies. And when all the smashing and checking was over, there was no wastage. Every egg was processed and frozen for use in bakeries.

And the results of this intriguing experiment? We don't know. The news item in the BBC London Letter didn't say that. That's British reserve for you! The hens, too, must be just as impatient as we are for the low-down on this analysis, will just have to wait. It will likely be embodied in some learned treatise they won't be able to read, nor we either. In the meantime, all we can do is give the story as it comes to us, for our farmers to make what they can of it.

U.S. Court Ruling

The U.S. Supreme Court's ruling on the constitutionality of the prayer recited daily in a New York state school is bound to have implications for religion in general as practiced in public or in state-supported schools across the United States.

The decision Monday declaring the prayer unconstitutional clears the way for some minority groups to challenge the constitutionality of many religious practices commonplace in schools today.

The prayer, Supreme Court Justice Hugo L. Black, born in Alabama and once denounced as a racist after the disclosure he had belonged to the Ku Klux Klan, delivered the majority opinion.

It was drafted in 1951 by the Board of Regents, a governmental body which has wide supervisory, legislative and executive powers over public schools in New York state.

The prayer was adopted in 1954 by the school district of New Hyde Park, a Long Island community about 20 miles from New York City.
