Heavy Surf Handicaps North Lake Fishermen

At North Lake on Saturday commercial and pleasure fishermen were out in numbers, and both were hampered by the cold and unfavorable northerly winds which have prevailed for a week. A heavy surf created a steady breeze blowing straight in from the broad sweep of the Gulf, and tumbled in high combers on the beach, both the lobster fishing boats considerably. Entering and leaving the "run" leading to the protective waters of North Lake proper was a tricky business. Hauling traps in the long heavy swells outside was a laborious task.

It was dangerous, too, entering and leaving North Lake Harbor. On Friday one of the boats was found ashore and badly damaged by the heavy breakers. Owned by William Acorn, she was leaving North Lake to haul traps when caught in the surf by a heavy sea. The lowering wave filled the boat, and stopped her engine. A hole was punched in her hull and she was tossed on shore. Mr. Acorn reached safely without difficulty.

The damaged craft is being repaired and will be on the fishing grounds again in a few days' time. Two factories are operating at North Lake. Mr. Earl Johnson owns the largest of these, and employs more than fifty people. Forty-five boats feed lobsters to this busy plant.

The smaller plant, owned by Mr. Lester Lecco of Murray River, is packing the landings of about twenty boats and has twenty employees. Although the northerly winds of the past few days have hampered fishing, catches have been fairly good and both factories are packing fair quantities of this dinner table favorite.

Trout fishermen, a score or more of them, gave the more sheltered waters of North Lake itself a combing with bait and fly. Those who fished from the banks and from the North Lake bridge found it cold and their efforts not very rewarding.

Those who arrived in the late afternoon had an unfavorable tide to contend with and only as darkness began to fall did the fishermen begin to see much action. Throughout the late afternoon the fishing was slow, with the tide at low ebb. Only the luckiest of the anglers managed to land a few trout at this slack tide period.

Midway between North Lake Bridge and the Run, and in the lake itself, several fishing parties were anchored offshore, and a few large fish were landed. One "fuddy" MacKinnon, of Charlottetown, with the tide favorable, hooked four trout, all scaling two pounds or more. A few days previously Mr. MacKinnon had several fish weighing three to four pounds in his creel caught at the same spot. All of Mr. MacKinnon's biggest fish were taken on streamer flies, and were caught in mid-lake, from a boat.

Mr. Al Cummings, known to many Island fishermen, and who acts as guide and counselor to many visitors to the Lake, was on hand as usual on Saturday. Mr.

Cummings, with his customary courtesy gave the anglers who called on him all of his up-to-the-minute information about fishing conditions. His two boats were also placed at the disposal of his visitors.
