Winds Of Hurricane Force Bring Damage To Europe

LONDON (Reuters) — Europe, which has just emerged from a month of snow, freezing weather and floods, was lashed Friday by winds of hurricane force.

The highest wind recorded, at the top of Zugspitze, Germany's highest mountain, was 93 miles an hour.

The winds piled up pack ice 40 feet high in Oresund channel between Denmark and Sweden, and Stockholm recorded the lowest barometric reading in more than 20 years.

The gales were responsible for three deaths in England. Christopher Afukunlyander, an engineering student, was killed in Doncaster when the wind brought a chimney plunging through his roof and onto the bed where he was sleeping.

At Dronfield, 100 houses were so badly damaged that a councilman said they looked as if they had been blitzed.

SHIPS DISABLED The gale left ships disabled all around the English coast.

MONTREAL (CP) — Industrial prices held some substantial gains at the close of active trading Friday on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges.

Aluminium climbed three points to a new high. In the oils, Imperial added 3/4 and Canadian oil 1/2. Shawinigan advanced a point in the utilities to reach a new high.

The stock exchange's closing averages show banks up 0.03 at 52.45, utilities up 0.14 at 154.39, and industrials up 0.2 at 202.5. Copper up 0.4 at 246.7, papers up 21.0 at 1455.37 and golds up 0.25 at 79.44.
