GEORGETOWN FERRY.—There is, we learn, much discontent in Georgetown on account of the removal of the Steam ferry boat. Georgetown has been shamefully treated in respect to ferrage.

THE CUNARD LINE.—Orders have been given for the construction of several new steamships for the Cunard Line. Messrs. Thomson, of Glasgow, have been engaged for the building of three. The first of the series will be a steamship of 5000 tons for the Atlantic service. This vessel is to be called the Gallia. She will be the largest and most powerful steamer yet built for the Cunard Service.—Shipping and Mercantile Gazette, Sept. 12.

Mr. McKENZIE boasts that the Maritime Provinces will go with him almost to a man, or a member, at the coming election. And by the way of enforcement to Mr. McKenzie's declaration, Mr. Cartwright is going about telling the people of Ontario that Nova Scotia got more than she had a right to in 1869; that the New Brunswick subsidy of \$150,000 was an outrage; and that the financial terms with Prince Edward Island were ruinous to the Dominion. Mr. Cartwright's eminently frank statements are a curious commentary on Mr. McKenzie's boasts.—Herald.

The missing girl, Hurley, who disappeared from Port Philip some days ago, it is believed, is one and the same with the corpse of the young woman picked up two weeks ago at Cape Traverse. The girl has always been mentally clouded, and it is believed she went across the Straits in a punt. A relative of hers has gone over to establish the identity if possible.

LONDON, Sept. 27.

A banquet was given in honor of Gen. Grant by the Mayor and corporation of Sheffield to-night, and the proceedings were very enthusiastic. Mr. Mundella, M. P., in a cordial speech, proposed his health. General Grant's reply referred to his constant aim during his presidency to establish a good understanding with England.

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.

Sydney Meyers, President of the Merchants, Farmers and Mechanics Savings Bank, Chicago, which suspended last week, was indicted by the Grand Jury for embezzlement of \$200,000 and imprisoned. The Jury also indicted the officers of the defunct Protection Life Insurance Company on the charge of defrauding the policy holders.

OTTAWA, Sept. 27.

Preparations are being made here for a general election. Dr. Grant is spoken of as the Conservative candidate. D. A. Field arrested at Quebec for carrying large quantities of diamonds, is here to be recouped by Government. The arrest was unnecessary and vexatious.

MONTREAL, Sept. 27.

As proof of the revival of trade the Grand Trunk receipts for the week ending 15th inst. aggregated \$207,075, an increase of \$16,566 over last year.

To the Editor of the Daily Examiner:

DEAR SIR,—I entirely agree with your observations as to the manner in which the Exhibition at Georgetown was conducted and arranged. Allow me now to give some suggestions to the men in authority, whoever they are, as to the Horticulture and Floriculture; for those are my chief interests.

First, then, as to "Celery." The celery that takes the prize in our Exhibitions, is that which has the longest bleached stalk. This is certainly wrong. All people who love this vegetable know that the part nearest the root is the most crisp and most delicately flavoured; and this is the reason that the "Boston Market" is almost universally preferred in the United States. It grows short and very thick at the root. Yet, such celery as this would have no chance at our shows.

Secondly, the squashes that take the prizes here, are the largest and heaviest, and they are the "Mammoth"—the "Mammoth Chile" or the "Chile. These squashes are never used for the table. No one could eat them, unless very hungry. They are grown in the States entirely for stock. The proper squash for the table are divided into two varieties; the early and the late, or winter keeping. Perhaps, of all the early sorts, the "early summer bush crookneck" should have the first place, and of the late, the "Boston Marrow" and "Cubbard." We should have three prizes instead of one for squashes: first, for the early summer sort, the best winter keeping, and the large sorts for cattle.

Third, the "Parsnips." The long, narrow, clean parsnip should take the prize, not the great thick thing that is only fit for the pigs.

Fourth, beets should be black and clean, with small taper roots, not large.

I will content myself with these four different sorts of vegetables, as they are the ones in which our Judges are the most likely to go wrong with. In fact, the main thing is to have good Judges. At the last show I noticed, for one example, that a large Pumpkin took the prize for best squash; and a large yellow squash took the prize for best pumpkin. No doubt this was only a slip upon the part of the Judges; but still more discouraging for those who take an interest in their gardens. As to the flowers, the difficulty of obtaining good judges is still greater. Such a thing as good flowers is hardly known in P. E. Island. In fact they are only grown by a very few. How disheartening then it must be for the owner of a bouquet of flowers at the "show," to be called upon by the Judges themselves to say whether a flower is a purple verbena or a heliotrope! Yet, a gentleman who had flowers at the show at Georgetown, assured me that this actually happened there; and the same gentleman informed me that he took a prize for best double caranations with a bunch of double-red geraniums. Please let us have heliotropes included in the list next time. Perhaps the judges will know them by sight next Exhibition. There is a slight difference between between a heliotrope and a verbena.

Pesth, Sept. 27.

In the Hungarian Diet to-day, Prime Minister Tisza, replying to an interpellation by several influential Deputies on the Eastern question, said the foreign policy hitherto pursued had resulted in the fact now no danger whatever threatens the interests of the monarchy. He denied that the Government exercised neutrality in any way unduly favorable to Russia, or that the policy pursued by the Hungarian Government was contrary to the opinion of the Hungarian people. The Government's policy consisted now as formerly in the protection of the interests of the country without war if possible, but, at the same time, in protecting them in every contingency.
