Fraud Charges Are Withdrawn

Three charges of fraud against Jean Marie LeBlanc of Fox Creek, N.B. were withdrawn by the Crown yesterday in Queen's County magistrate's court after defence counsel indicated that prosecution had been made by the accused in all cases.

Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, presided. Crown prosecutor was Alan K. Seales and J. P. Nicholson acted for the defence.

Mr. Nicholson is also acting on behalf of Heath William Bowyer. Bowyer case was adjourned to Jan. 6 at 9:30 a.m. when Mr. Nicholson said there would be no further witnesses. Mr. Owen was remanded with bail to stand on Jan. 10 on the request of the Crown.

A charge of failing to have a vehicle registered in his name was withdrawn by the Crown against Charles Richard Clary. Clary was charged with driving while impaired.

Co-op Housing Tax Appeal Taken Under Adversement

"No City Councilor or employee could assure anyone the city assessments and tax rate would remain stable," Mayor A. Wathen Gaudet told the Tax Appeal Board yesterday hearing appeals from civic taxes.

The Mayor had been called by the board when A. E. Belliveau, representing the North River Co-op Housing group, said they had been promised annual taxes on the properties they proposed building would be approximately \$125 a year. Mr. Belliveau said that figure had been received from both the Mayor and city assessor, Ernest Selzer.

Mayor Gaudet told board chairman, Frank Storey, and fellow members, N. W. Lowther and Alfred Hennessy he believed the estimate came from an estimated cost of \$6,500 per unit at the time the estimates were made. The Mayor said the tax rate was increased to \$2.85 per \$100 valuation. He said that City Council had given every encouragement to the housing group in the beginning and quoted from the minutes of a Council meeting which dealt with proposals for provision of streets, water and sewerage facilities.

Mr. Selzer denied having written a letter to the Housing Commission saying the taxes would be \$125. No such letter was produced.

He showed the board papers containing figures which he said were the basis on which the city worked for taxation purposes. The figures were confirmed by John Squarbrick, assistant tax collector. The figures were not given out.

Mr. Belliveau said he distinctly remembered Mr. Selzer stating the taxes would be approximately \$125 and added the statement was made in the office of Reid Sanzger, chairman of the provincial housing commission and was the basis for approval of receipts to join the housing groups. Each applicant was considered on the basis of what he could pay.
