



A SECTION OF THE PARADE AT MONTAGUE

Remembrance Program Held At Montague On 11th

A very impressive Remembrance Day service was held at Montague yesterday when veterans, armed service units, community organizations, and citizens joined in paying tribute to the honored dead and courageous living who offered their lives in two world conflicts to preserve their way of life.

The parade, under the direction of Parade Marshal Rod Martin, formed at the Legion Home. Following the Marshal were the standard bearers, pipers, R. C. M. P. veterans, Charlottetown Boy Scout bugle band, Reserve Army, Boy Scouts, Cubs, and Girl Guides.

The colorful parade moved off and continued on Main Street to the Memorial School where a wreath was laid, after which the parade continued to the Kings County Memorial Hospital where the ceremony was held.

En route the salute was taken by Major Michael Campbell, Officer Commanding the Reserve Army, at the Federal Building. Present at the salute with Major Campbell were Mayor Bruce H. Yeo, Senator T.V. Grant, Senator Elsie Inman, and Judge J.S. DesRoches, President of the Montague Branch Canadian Legion.

At the hospital the ceremony opened with "O Canada," followed by a lament by pipers Donald MacLeod and Alan Cameron. The Last Post was sounded by Bugler George Boudreault, then two minutes silence, after which Reveille

was sounded. Comrade Rod Martin read the poem "They shall grow not old".

REPRESENTS MOTHERHOOD

Mrs. William Dewar, Brudenell, laid the first wreath representing the motherhood of Canada, followed by the laying of wreaths by the Legion, Town of Montague, Reserve Army, Oddfellows, High School and citizens.

Rev. J.W. McCordie delivered a short address, a tribute to the fallen heroes who had given up their lives in two World Wars, and also a remembrance to all veterans who had offered their lives in defense of their country. He said that they had left home to preserve the principles of democracy, their love of right, liberty and justice. Recognizing their great sacrifice, he said, we must not let ourselves be lulled into complacency, for there are forces at work ready to undermine and destroy the principles of our way of life. He said that we must not become listless if it would survive, and we must re-dedicate ourselves to the cause of cherishing and protecting our country's democracy.

The ceremony closed with the playing of "The Last Post" and a prayer by Comrade W.A. Paterson, reading of honor roll of Georgetown veterans who died while serving in world wars and two by L.S. Batchelder.
