## Bonnell Has Strong Criticism Over Plans To Shut-Down Plant

Strong criticism was voiced last evening to the proposed closing of the government cold storage plant on Escher Street, by M. Lorne Bonnell, M.D., in his capacity as acting leader of the provincial Liberal party.

"There are many reasons why this plant should not be closed but the need for its services in strawberry time is one of the most important," the Murray River man said.

The statement of the acting leader is as follows: "I was greatly disturbed when I read in the press that the Prince Edward Island government intends to close the Island Cold Storage on Escher Street.

"This plant has always provided a great service to our farmers and fishermen and Island people in general. I fear for the future of our strawberry and blueberry producers; for

what it will cost the tourist trade, and the fish packers as well as the primary producers in agriculture and fishing in this province if the government does not reconsider its decision.

"I am also informed that as many as 45 people are employed at this plant in the busiest part of the summer months.

"I would think that the government should definitely reconsider this decision, and take immediate steps to build a new public cold storage plant.

"I am informed by reliable sources that the present building can carry on until a new cold storage could be provided. I hope," Dr. Bonnell added, "that the government decision to close this Island Cold Storage plant is not for the purpose of giving a monopoly to private interests."

"During the summer months this cold storage has been used for strawberries, blueberries, meats, butter, fish, hides, cheese, frozen vegetables and bait for fishermen.

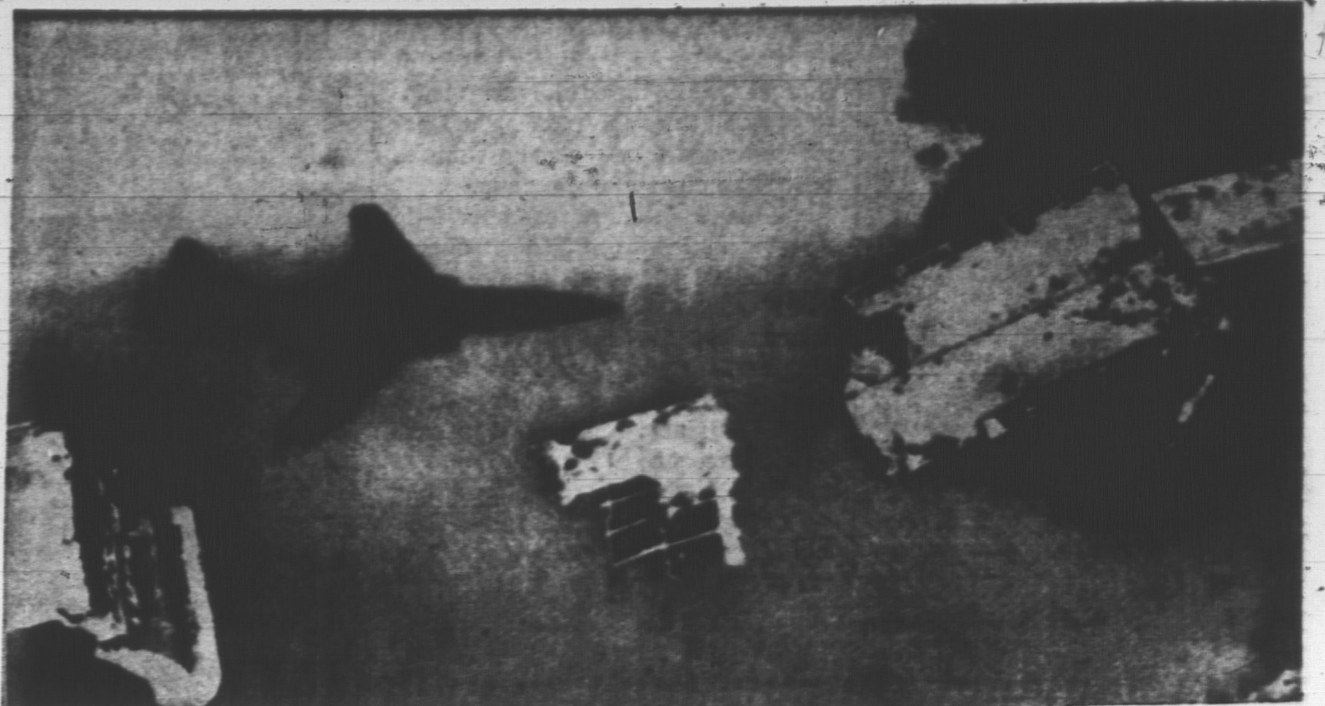

### U.S. Planning To Increase Viet Nam Force

SAIGON (Reuters) — The United States plans to boost its strength in South Viet Nam by more than 5,000 men in the next two months, informed sources said Sunday.

The reports came as the Communist Viet Cong guerrillas launched their first attack on a U.S. marine outpost near Da Nang air base, 375 miles northeast of here, killing two marines and wounding four other men.

U.S. Ambassador Maxwell Taylor was reported to have conferred with South Vietnamese Premier Phan Huy Quat on the plan to boost U.S. strength in South Viet Nam which was approved at the recent Honolulu meeting of top U.S. officials.

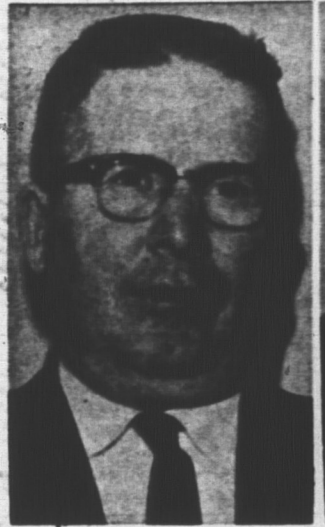
The plan still awaits a final decision by President Johnson, the sources said.

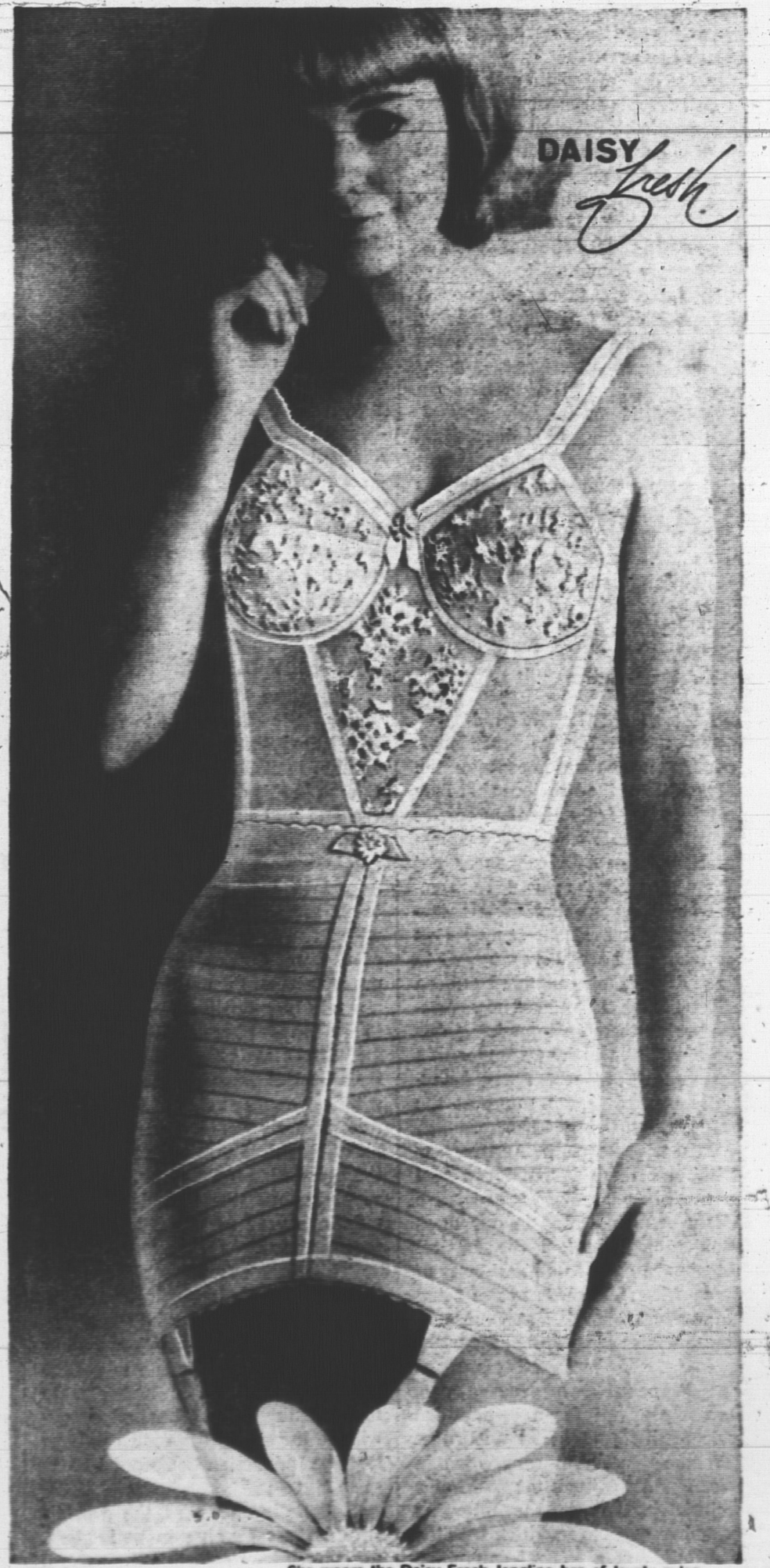
