

# Dulles Tones Down Views On Western Powers' Split

WASHINGTON (AP)—State Secretary Dulles said Tuesday there was "some difference" with Britain on the Suez Canal dispute but two hours later he re-iterated his press conference record on the subject.

In a reply to a reporter, Dulles said the differences are the result of an American desire to play "a somewhat independent role" in dealing with anti-colonial powers. Later, after editing his press conference transcript, he authorized a spokesman to report he was not in agreement with "There has been some difference."

Dulles also toned down his earlier remarks that these differences involve "fundamental differences" such as the American desire to encourage newly-independent nations toward non-violent development.

**INDEPENDENT ROLE**  
Press officer Lincoln White, who had reported of the changed answers, declined to say whether the differences which Dulles first spoke about had been somehow resolved in the intervening two hours.

It seemed more likely that Dulles changed his remarks for fear of offending British and French foreign ministers with whom he plans to meet in New York Friday.

However, in his revised answer, Dulles acknowledged that the American view toward the problem of colonialism in Asia and Africa is "not always identical" with that of Britain and France.

"Now, there the United States plays a somewhat independent role," he said.

"I suspect that the United States will find that its role, not only today but in the coming years, will be to try to aid that process (of orderly independence) without identifying itself 100 per cent either with the so-called colonial powers or with the powers which are primarily and uniquely concerned with the problem of getting their independence as rapidly as possible."

**NO FEELING**  
Talking to reporters, Dulles also indirectly replied to critics who have said that the Suez Canal Users Association which he sponsored has had its teeth pulled.

"There is talk about the teeth being pulled out of it," he said. "There were never teeth in it, if that means the use of force."

Answering queries on other foreign policy developments, Dulles also:

1. Appealed to Europe to unite as "a third great power" in the world but said it was "unthinkable that it should be neutral toward Soviet communism."
2. Reported he has "no reason to doubt" that Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito is sticking to his longstanding desire for independence from Russian control, despite his secret conferences with Soviet leaders.
3. Supported Israel's demand to be heard before the United Nations to voice its long-standing complaint against Egypt for barring Israeli shipping from the Suez Canal.



## Will Head Protestant Welfare Campaign, Opening In Nov.

Mr. A. J. Haslam will be the general chairman of the Protestant Welfare Bureau campaign which opens in Charlottetown and vicinity in November. Mr. R. J. Rupert was named publicity director.

Mr. Haslam has been associated with many successful campaigns in the City and under his leadership the success of this first drive for funds for the Welfare Bureau is assured. Mr. Rupert has also been associated with more than 30 major campaigns in the City and has a wide knowledge of publicity work pertaining thereto.

The two campaign leaders were named at a well attended meeting of the Board of directors of the Bureau held last night at the Y.M.C.A. Mr. Edwin C. Johnstone presided.

The Protestant Welfare Bureau which was established in Charlottetown last May is under the direction of Mr. Walter O. Baker with an office at 100 Fitzroy Street.

The campaign will call for an objective of \$12,000.

## Fewer Available Pickers For Potatoes This Year

Some doubt as to whether the National Employment Offices in Summerside and Charlottetown will be able to obtain a sufficient number of potato pickers to handle this year's crop is reported by the officials. For about ten years the Province has relied on help imported principally from Pictou County, and Cape Breton and occasionally some from New Brunswick points. But this year very few men are available from Pictou County or any of the Nova Scotia mainland communities. The apple growers of the Annapolis Valley have recruited many apple pickers and the supply of men for seasonal work has about dried up.

Only on Cape Breton Island are men to be had, and perhaps not in sufficient quantities to fill the demands of Prince Edward Island potato growers. Over the week-end about a hundred men reached Summerside and another hundred were due to arrive last night. However the National Employment Office in Summerside has orders for more than four hundred pickers, and obtaining an extra two hundred from Cape Breton will be a difficult task.

Officials of the Charlottetown Employment Office report the situation as well in hand in Queens and Kings Counties at the moment, but any rush of orders would be hard to fill. Usually the Charlottetown office imports less than a hundred men each year and the potato movement is much smaller than the one handled in Prince County. Both employment offices in the province have been recruiting all possible local help. The National Employment Offices in Cape Breton are also making great efforts to round up as many pickers as possible.



## Met With YMCA Board Last Evening

J.W. McVicar, Secretary for Physical Education on the staff of the National Council of Canadian Y.M.C.A.'s and Vice-president of Association of Y.M.C.A. Secretaries of North America who met with Board and Committee members of the local "Y" last evening.

Mr. McVicar who was born in Guelph, Ont. is a B.Sc. in Physical Education from Springfield College, (Mass.) and has held responsible positions in the Y.M.C.A. in various Canadian cities since 1928. In 1953 he received the Robert-Gulick Award, which is the top honour bestowed by the YMCA Physical Director's Society of North America. He is the only Canadian to have been president of the Directors Society and to receive the Memorial Award. Mr. McVicar will be in Charlottetown for several days and will be guest speaker at the Centennial's Mens Club tonight.

## Design, Styling of '57 Ford New From Ground Up

For the first time in its 52-year history, Ford of Canada will produce five distinctive series of Ford cars in two different sizes in its 1957 line. It was announced today by P.G. Willey, general manager Ford-Monarch Sales Division, Ford Motor Company of Canada Limited.

The 18 new models to be unveiled by Ford-Monarch dealers across Canada on October 3 will have the highest performance engines ever offered in the low price field.

Mr. Willey said the 1957 Fords "represent the biggest change in the modern history of the Ford car."

The 1957 Fairlane and Fairlane 500 sedans are nine inches longer and four inches lower than last year's comparable models. Custom and Custom 300 sedans are more than three inches longer and nearly 3 1/2 inches lower than the 1956 models. Station wagons are 21 inches longer and nearly six inches longer. Fairlains and Fairlane 500's are built on a 118-inch wheelbase. Station wagons, Customs and Custom 300's have a 116-inch wheelbase.

"There has been no sacrifice of headroom inside the car, in spite of their reduced height," Mr. Willey said. "The new frame extends to the sides of the car, and this permits the floor to be lowered inside the frame rails."

"The design and styling are new from the ground up. Every dimension is changed. Wheels, frame, rear axle, drive shaft, engines, and every inch of sheet metal in every body style are definite departures from past models," he explained.

Riding ease has been greatly improved by using longer, wider frame with lower pressure tires on wider treads, and employing redesigned ball-joint suspension in front and outboard-mounted longer-leaf springs in back.

"Durability is built into the 1957 Ford through stronger alloy materials, greater use of insulation and sound-deadening materials, longer-wearing fabrics and plastics, and strengthening of mechanical parts," Mr. Willey pointed out.

For 1957, a special high performance V-8 engine is available as an optional power plant on all Ford cars in the Custom 300, Fairlane and Fairlane 500 series. The engine, called the Thunderbird Special, develops 245 horsepower, and is equipped with a four-barrel carburetor.

Standard engine for the Fairlane and station wagon series is the 212 h.p. Thunderbird V-8. A 190 h.p. V-8 is standard for the Custom.

## New Golf Tee Heart Operation

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new and ingenious "golf tee" operation inside the human heart has saved the life of a Washington State man, surgeons at the National Heart Institute disclosed Tuesday.

Norman Hickey, 28, of Richland, Wash., is the first human to undergo the surgery.

The operation involved using a spongy plastic plug-shaped like a golf tee but bigger—to close up a small tunnel Hickey had developed between the base of his aorta, the big blood pipeline from the heart, and one of the heart's main chambers.

The material used to make the "tee" is the same as that in sponges used by housewives for washing dishes.

Correction of the rare and hitherto almost invariably fatal condition took place in a two-hour operation during which blood flow to the heart was closed off for 4 1/2 minutes.

With one hand inside the heart chamber — which had been cut open — and the other placed through another incision in the aorta, a surgeon guided the plug into place.

Hickey had a leakage of blood back into the heart from the aorta. Only 40 cases of this particular defect — believed to be partially congenital — have been reported in world medical literature.

The operation was preceded by technique on experimental animals — involving purposely making such a defect in 21 dogs and curing them with a golf tee plug.

Hickey had been faced with certain death prior to the operation, the institute surgeons told reporters.

## Increase In Development

HALIFAX (CP)—Nelson Mann, executive manager of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council said Tuesday \$480,000,000 will likely be spent in regional development this year.

He told the Canadian Association of Real Estate Board that investment trends indicate \$100,000,000 will be invested in Newfoundland. This is 10 per cent more than in 1955.

Capital expenditure in Prince Edward Island would be about \$21,000,000 compared with \$16,000,000 in 1955.

Investment reports show capital expenditure in Nova Scotia will be greater than any period since the Second World War, he said. Investment is expected to exceed \$170,000,000 this year.

New Brunswick investment was expected to increase 25 per cent over last year and reach about \$190,000,000.

## Canadians Get Break In Boston

BOSTON (AP) — Two Canadian sailors who jumped into Boston harbor to escape arrest for assaulting a cab driver with intent to rob him were fined \$50 each Tuesday on a reduced charge of larceny.

Judge George W. Roberts told Jean Jacques Lalonde, 21, of Gattineau Point, Que., and Robert Hicks, 20, of Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., he was giving them "a break."

"You look like decent men," the judge said.

The Canadians, both from the destroyer HMCS Nootka, originally were charged with assault with intent to rob.

The judge ruled there was no probable cause for holding the pair for the grand jury on the charge and wished them bon voyage.

## McGee Case In County Court

Hearings in the break, entry and theft case of Harry Wendell McGee of Charlottetown opened in the court of Queen's County Court yesterday morning with Judge C. St. Clair Trainor presiding.

The case arose out of a theft which occurred at the store of T. L. Smith, corner of Sydney and Cumberland Streets on July 1st. It was first heard by Stipendiary Magistrate K. M. Martin before it was committed for trial before Judge Trainor on July 18, 1956.

In the case first arose, McGee was also charged with escaping from the custody of the Queen's County jail on two different occasions while serving a 30-days sentence. R. R. Bell, Q. C., appeared for the defence while J. P. Nicholson represented the crown.

Thomas Creighton, as first witness, and proprietor of the store reviewed the discovery of the break for the court Constable Gordon Humphrey, R. C. M. P. in charge of the Identification Section of the Island Division, and Sgt. A. M. Johnston, R. C. M. P., both gave evidence regarding the similarity of the fingerprints, which they picked up on the broken window through which the suspect entered, and those of Mee.

The defence presented no evidence, and following a slight recess between counsel about the fingerprints, the case was adjourned for judgment until October 10.

## Withdraw Charges Against Alderman

MONCTON (CP)—Six informants laid against Alderman Lloyd Keating by members of city council were withdrawn in police court Tuesday.

Alderman Keating appeared to answer to five of the six charges and R. D. Milton, representing the informants, requested withdrawal of the informations.

Mr. Milton also requested withdrawal of the information laid by Mayor Harris Joyce. This case was to be heard Oct. 9.

The informations were laid when the council members alleged that they had received telegrams from Mr. Keating containing false information and with false signatures.

The council members said earlier the telegrams, allegedly from community organizations, urged them to oppose construction of a supermarket in the city's north end. Mr. Keating was suspended from council when the charges were laid.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—How prominent candidates fared in Tuesday's Newfoundland election: S. J. Hefferton, minister of municipal affairs and supply and a member of the provincial cabinet since Confederation in 1949, was re-elected in Trinity South.

John T. Cheeseman, appointed fisheries minister several months ago and contesting his first election, was elected in Burgeo-Lalonde.

G. J. Power, finance minister since 1951, was elected in the new riding of Placentia East.

B. J. Abbott, former magistrate in Grand Falls and appointed welfare minister last June, was elected in the new riding of Gander.

L. Humber West, Labor Minister Charles Ballam was re-elected. He has been minister of labor since 1949.

E. S. Spencer, works minister since Dec. 1951, was re-elected in Grand Falls.

Education Minister F. W. Rowe, former minister of mines and resources, was re-elected in White Bay South. He previously represented Labrador.

Samuel Drover, who left the Liberal party in 1954 and became leader of the CCF, was defeated in White Bay South.

In Ferryland, Provincial Affairs Minister Myles P. Murray, elected to the legislature in a 1952 by-election, was returned.

Premier Joseph Smallwood, who led Newfoundland into Confederation with Canada in 1949, was re-elected in Bonaville North where he was opposed by a CCF candidate.

**SOCIALIST SPEAKER**  
PARIS (AP) — Socialist Andre Le Troquer was re-elected Speaker of the French National Assembly Tuesday on the second ballot. His victory came when the big Communist bloc switched to his support as expected, from favorite Marcel Cachin. Communist backing of Le Troquer is part of the party's effort to make common cause with the Socialists, who are expected to win.
