**THEY MUST BE ONE AMONG THOSE GOD LOVES**

The parish priest of austerity went up to a tall church steeple to be nearer God, that he might bring God's word down to the people. "And in sermon script he daily wrote what he thought was sent from heaven. And he poured it down on his people's heads three times one day in seven. In his age God said: 'Come down and die!' And he cried from out his steeple: 'Where art Thou, Lord?' and the Lord replied: 'Down here among my people.'"

With last week's thought still in mind and a great, practical understanding on our hands, we can see the bearing of this little poem in our situation. God is among us, people, and he who would find God and serve Him must be one with those whom God loves and sustains.

And yet we dare not separate the spiritual ecstasy from the practical ministry. The two are inextricably woven together.

The story of Jesus' transfiguration, with its origin and outcome, holds us at this point. Away up in Mount Hermon, God came to His Son, in a transforming experience. The splendor of the Divine incoming was so glorious and intense that the Master's appearance was changed and His countenance shone like the sun. God came to Him with an overwhelming communication of His love and a personal reassurance of His Sonship and His mission. "This is my beloved Son; listen to Him." The word that came from the Father's lips, but the spoken word only gave voice to that all-absorbing experience.

**GOD'S RESPONSE**

Now that experience was God's response to a profound consecration. In a period of retirement at Caesarea, Philip, Peter had acknowledged Jesus' Messiahship and Jesus had accepted the acknowledgment as a revelation from His Father. But He had added words as the Messiah means the Cross and the crucified life for all men.

It was in answer to His acceptance of God's will that God came in man's salvation that God came in glory to His Son on the Mount. The Father thus confirmed His Son's vision and decision.

With Jesus on the Mount were three of His followers, and they awoke as from a dream to find Moses and Elijah talking with their Master. The rapture of Jesus which they began to share was so thrilling that they wanted to make it permanent, and St. Peter suggested that they build three booths in which Jesus and His Heavenly visitors might stay.

But instead Jesus took them down from the mountain to the plain, struggling in vain to free a stoned lad from the evil spirit that was torturing him. Jesus set the troubled spirit free, and then called His followers to that higher
