No Small Type For Women Peers No Longer Love

LONDON (AP)—DeBrett's, the dignified firm of nobility, declared firmly Wednesday that it won't permit a man to list his wife in small print just because she has fallen out of his affections.

It also urged a better way to keep titles from going astray, and said it won't be a go-between for wealthy American women who wish to support poor but deserving peers.

These views were laid down in a new 2,000-page edition of the 155-year-old Chronicle. C. F. J. Hankinson, the editor, wrote in the preface that he particularly worried about keeping track of the children of nobility.

"Within the last year or two several cases have arisen of children in the direct line of succession to titles being repudiated by their fathers," he wrote in the preface to the new edition.

As to unloved wives and small print, Hankinson wrote that one peer attempted to keep his wife's name out of DeBrett's, but finally "amended his plea by requesting me to tuck her away in very small type down at the bottom along with her daughter."

"The responsibility seemed a heavy one, and we felt obliged to decline the invitation to nominate someone," the editor said.

Suggests P.M. As Patron Saint

HALIFAX (CP)—Works Minister Winters referred to Prime Minister St. Laurent as "St. Louis" Tuesday night and suggested he would be a good choice as the patron saint of Canada. Mr. Winters addressed the Halifax St. George's Society.

Said he: "In the absence of any special patron saint to stand guard over the fates of Canada as a whole, I find it very difficult not to urge all those present—perhaps with the exception of the premier (Progressive Conservative Robert Stanfield of Nova Scotia) and a few others—to place their trust in St. Louis...at least for the next four or five years."

Hankinson suggested that the registrar general, who keeps track of births, be better informed as to what goes on in divorce courts.

"Failing this," he said, "there will exist the danger that at some future time when succession to one of the titles involved takes place, all the necessary proof required to establish the rights to the title could be produced by a man who had been shown by evidence in the divorce courts to have been illegitimate."

WON'T MEASURE AFFECTION

"I am not disposed to allow the size of the type used in describing a wife to become an indication of the measure of affection existing between her and her husband," Hankinson said.

"Otherwise I fear that in some cases it would only be possible to read the wife's name with a magnifying glass."

Co-Pilot Says He Asked About Re-fuelling Stop On Flight

WINNIPEG (CP)—A five-member court martial Wednesday told that the pilot of an RCAF Mitchell bomber which crashed Feb. 17 during a residential area while trying to land at Winnipeg's Stevenson Field had been asked by his co-pilot about a refuelling stop on the flight from Vancouver to Winnipeg.

The co-pilot, FO D. R. Gibson, told the court that it was the pilot's decision to continue on past the last refuelling stop at Rivers, Man., and into Winnipeg and that he could not go against the decision of his crew captain to carry on.

The 28-year-old pilot, FO John Sargent of Westwood, Ont., is facing four charges in the court martial which started Wednesday at RCAF station Winnipeg.

He pleaded not guilty to charges of negligently failing to make a refuelling stop en route when he knew or should have known that his plane had insufficient fuel to complete the flight; negligently failing to take appropriate emergency landing action on the approach to the Winnipeg field; and negligently signing a false entry in a document signed by him which was required for official purposes.

He pleaded guilty to a fourth charge of conduct to the prejudice of good order and discipline in that he planned his plane at Patricia Bay, B.C. and so deviated from flight authorization orders.

The bomber pancaked into a residential section of nearby St. James, damaging three houses. The six persons aboard escaped serious injury and no one on the ground was injured.

FO Gibson said a fuel reading was taken close to Rivers, about 32 minutes from Winnipeg. He said that about 20 miles from Stevenson Field, near Oakville, the starboard engine began to miss and the fuel pressure gauge indicated that the engine was not getting enough fuel.

FO Gibson said he told the crew corporal to cross-lead—a method of feeding both engines from the same tank. This was done and the engine returned to normal.

He said he made contact with the control tower at the field and asked for landing priority over other planes. At this time, he said, the starboard tank showed about 20 American gallons. He said he was not certain of the other tank.

Asked if he knew the plane was short of fuel he said: "I knew we were low."
