

N. Y. Stays In Contention With 6-2 Win Over Leafs

NEW YORK (AP) — New York Rangers, getting two goals each from Andy Bathgate and Guy Gendron, broke a three game National Hockey League losing string Sunday night with a 6-2 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs.

The muscular Leafs, normally one of the hardest checking teams in the league, didn't seem to have their hearts in it and the Rangers took full advantage.

Bathgate's first goal brought New York from behind a 1-0 deficit in the first period. The Rangers took a 3-2 margin in the second and made a rout of it when the Leaf defence gave way in the final session.

Referee John Ashley called only three penalties, all against Toronto.

Bathgate's second goal came on a power play in the second period. His two markers gave the league-leading scorer 23 this season.

Other New York scorers were Andy Hebenton and Johnny Wilson.

Red Kelly got Toronto's first goal and Bert Ostrom narrowed the count to 3-2 with another late in the middle period.

The Leafs, struggling to make a run at the first-place Montreal Canadiens, were at their best in the second period. After Gendron and Bathgate gave New York a 3-1 lead, the Leafs put on their strongest attack, leading to Ostrom's goal.

The third period was all New York, with the Rangers sewing up their first victory in seven starts against the Leafs.

Hawks Blank Boston 6-0

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago Black Hawks concentrated most of their power in the first period Sunday night as they blasted Boston Bruins 6-0 in a one-sided National Hockey League game.

The Hawks, who moved to within five points of the second-place Toronto Maple Leafs with the triumph, scored five times in the first game. Right-winger Murray Balfour scored twice, while Stan Mikita, Bronco Horvath and Ken Wharram each scored once.

Mikita got his second goal of the night in the third period.

Chicago goalie Glenn Hall ran his league-leading shut out total to seven by kicking out 30 Boston shots. Bruce Gamble of Boston was credited with 20 saves.

A major battle broke out in the final period, when Chicago's captain and defenceman Pierre Pilote and Andre Pronovost of the Bruins exchanged punches, then wrestled each other to the ice. Both drew major penalties.

Chicago's Bob Hull, third in league scoring, failed to increase his goals total, but did add a pair of assists to run his point count to 63.

Sizzling Red Wings Top Blake's Canadiens Sun.

DETROIT (AP)—The sizzling Detroit Red Wings, scoring three goals in the first 11 minutes, snapped the first-place Montreal Canadiens' four-game winning streak 4-2 Sunday night.

The Red Wings, battling to gain the National Hockey League playoffs, took command with rapid-fire goals by Bill Gadsby, Gordie Howe and Parke MacDonald before the Canadiens could muster a threatening rush. Howe added another goal in the second period between two by Montreal's Gilles Tremblay.

The victory was the third straight for the Wings and stretched their unbeaten streak to six since substitute goalie Hank Bassen took over two weeks ago for ailing Terry Sawchuk.

The Wings remained in a fourth-place deadlock with New York Rangers in the scramble for the last Stanley Cup berth. The Canadiens, losing for only the second time in 18 games, fought back from their 3-0 deficit with two goals in the second period by Tremblay. But Detroit got one tally in the period, by Howe, his 28th this season.

MARGIN UNCHANGED
 Despite the defeat the Canadiens retained their 11-point NHL lead over Toronto Maple Leafs, who were beaten 6-2 Sunday night by New York.

The NHL scoring race also remained unchanged. New York's Andy Bathgate matched Howe's two-goal performance and stayed six points ahead of the Detroit star.

Montreal, which has scored 15 goals in its last two games, fired 32 shots at Bassen, who blocked 30 of them. Tremblay beat him with a power-play shot 41 seconds after the second period started. Then Tremblay, who now has 25 goals, slapped a 25-footer past Bassen at 16:10 of the period for the final goal of the game.

Gadsby started the Wings off just 38 seconds after the opening faceoff with a 55-footer that sailed over Jacques Plante's shoulder before the Canadian goalie knew a shot had been fired. Howe made it 2-0 with a backhand at 6:35 of the period. At 10:13 MacDonald beat Plante with a backhand as he skated

There were two reasons for obtaining this knowledge: firstly, so that a precedent would not be established, and secondly, so that there would be no repercussions should the MacDonald rink win the championship.

As there were no Summerside rinks involved, one could hardly dispute the fact that my decision was absolutely unbiased.

In conclusion I would like to say that I wish the winners every success in their games in the "Diamond D" competition in Regina.
