Canada Wins Support For Full-Dress Trade Parley

MONT TREMBLANT, Que. (CP)—There were firm indications Monday night that Canada has won tentative Commonwealth approval of her proposal to hold a full-dress, 11-country Commonwealth trade and economic conference.

The spotlight now will be switched to Ottawa where Anglo-Canadian bilateral talks will be launched Wednesday to deal with Britain's proposal to establish a free-trade area between the two countries.

Canadian authorities, perhaps indicating the rather cool Canadian reaction to the plan, told reporters that the Anglo-Canadian talks would be informal. There would be no set agenda.

Asked whether the communiqué would include whatever Canadian proposals had been made, Mr. Fleming replied the statement would cover in general terms the scope of "whatever had been approved."

He was asked whether surplus disposal problems were discussed. Again he replied that reporters would have to wait and see what the communiqué contained.

Regrets Federal Reaction To U.K. Trade Offer

ST. PETER'S, N.S. (CP)—Nova Scotia Liberal leader Henry Hicks said Monday he regrets what he termed the "unfavorable" reaction of Finance Minister Fleming and other government spokesmen to Britain's offer to reduce trade barriers between that country and Canada.

Mr. Hicks' remarks were contained in the text of a speech released to the press in advance. He said it reflects on the good faith of recent promises to the British government and the Canadian people.
