CANADIAN MAIL SERVICE.

Views of the Dominion Line.
The Allen's will not say Anything.

MONTREAL, Sept. 22.—The contract with the Allan and Dominion lines expires with the close of navigation on the St. Lawrence, and speculation is rife as to what provision will be made by the Government for a continuance of the mail service. The Dominion Line's representative said yesterday that their boats would not call at Halifax if the subsidy was withdrawn, nor would they risk sending their boats to St. John if that port were named by the Government as the terminus of the service.

The Allan Line people would not say anything.

DOUBTS IN ENGLAND. English Traders Disappointed.

MONTREAL, Sept. 22.—A London cable says: "In view of uncertainties in the minds of English shippers respecting the Canadian tariff, the London Chamber of Commerce secretary says that the expectations of traders have undoubtedly been disappointed by the extension to practically all countries except the United States of what was previously supposed to be an exclusive British preference. This has tended to check the expected diversion into purely British channels of the trade now done through Britain with France, Germany, etc. Another retarding influence is the absence of exact official information as to the intentions of Canada after August next."

DEVLIN TIRED. Wants to Come Back to Canadian Politics.

OTTAWA, Sept. 22.—Reports are current that Mr. C. R. Devlin, ex-M. P., is tired of his immigration job in Ireland and is playing a pipe to get back into Canadian politics. His friends say that he may run for North Renfrew for the Ontario Legislature.

ENGLISH TRADE SYNDICATE.

Export of Canadian Products.

TORONTO, Sept. 22.—McPherson, Clark & Jarvis, barristers, have completed negotiations for an English syndicate to invest \$5,000,000 in Canada. The syndicate will export food products to Britain and will erect warehouses in Canada, one in Montreal, one in Toronto, and another in a city to be selected.

The syndicate will not touch grain or flour, but will handle all other food products, chiefly fruit and meats.

AS OTHERS SEE US

Impressions of Visiting Pressmen.
The members of the Eastern Township Press Association who visited this Province have reported favorably. The Times, of Richmond, which reflects the views of the President of the Association, says: "The luxuriant growth of vegetation of all kinds is wonderful, the grass is of the greenest and the flowers are of the most brilliant hues. The hay crop was mostly gathered, but showed a very strong second growth, the grain, not yet ripe, gave promise of heavy crops and showed the fertility of the soil. In one field we saw about thirty head of three year old steers, grade Durhams, and a letter lot the writer has never seen in the Eastern Townships. The cows, mostly grade Holssteins and Jerseys, looked in fine condition and spoke well of the pasturage."

As to Hotel Davies, The Times says: "The entire party, sixty in number, were taken to the Hotel Davies, which for comfort is unexcelled. Our stay in this hotel was made most enjoyable by our genial host Davies and his assistants. Think of fresh garden strawberries late in August at every meal to say nothing of other delicacies both in and out of season. The dining room of this hotel is one of the most tastefully arranged rooms one can see. The walls are decorated with the mounted heads of deer, moose and elk, a clock, made entirely of oyster shells, besides several cabinets of the most beautiful painted china; this painting is done by a marvellously clever young lady, a Miss Chisholm, the whole house is a showing evidence of her artistic taste. A tourist who would not be satisfied with the Davies would be hard to please."

The Richmond Guardian declares that "there is no portion of the Dominion that has a brighter face, or that affords more proof of genuine prosperity than this gem of the straits. It is beautiful beyond the dreams of the sleeper in Paradise, and we left it behind us with regret and a prayer that by some chance of fortune we might see it again."

Referring to Charlottetown the same writer says: "we did not enquire about the drainage of the city,—though almost our first thought on seeing how low in the water the Island stood, was that engineering science had a problem to solve in the drainage of Charlottetown. It might have already been solved for all we know; but anyway the city is an extremely healthy place."

LONDON, Sept. 21.—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Vienna says: It is reported that as Emperor William and Emperor Francis Joseph were leaving the station at Buda Pest a sharp detonation was heard, which was followed by a thick cloud of dust and smoke. The crowd took flight, broke through the military cordon and swarmed around the imperial carriage. Emperor Francis Joseph was greatly agitated, and shouted to the police to keep the people back. Some arrests are reported. The Neuwienner Journal was confiscated this evening for publishing telegrams as to the occurrence.
