Rev. Dr. Courtney a Bishop.

A POPULAR PREACHER, WHOM BOSTON DISLIKES TO LOSE. (Boston Herald.) It is to be regretted that Dr. Courtney is to leave Boston, for since he received the rectorship of St. Paul's Church, nearly six years ago, he has become one of the most highly esteemed of the clergy in this city.

He is a native of Plymouth, Eng., and is 50 years old. He was educated in part at Christ's Hospital, first at the preparatory school at Hartford, then the blue-coat school in Newgate Street, London. After that he graduated in the first class from King's College, London, in 1863, when Dr. Jelf, Dr. McCabe, Bishop Elliott, Dean Plumtree and Archdeacon Cheatham were professors there.

The degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred on him by Racine College. He was ordained priest in 1865 by the Archbishop of Canterbury. He was curate of Hurlow near Pembroke, Kent, from 1864 to 1867; incumbent of Charles Chapel, New St. Luke's, Plymouth, from 1867 to 1870; incumbent of St. Jude's, Glasgow, Scotland, from 1870 to 1876, and assistant minister of St. Thomas Church, New York, of which Dr. Morgan is rector, from 1876 to 1880.

He began his labors with St. James' Church in Chicago the first Sunday after Easter, 1880, and remained in that pastorate until March, 1882, when he accepted the call from St. Paul's Church in this city.

In stature, Dr. Courtney is tall, erect and well formed. He has grayish blue eyes. His cast of mind is not one-sided, and yet it is logical, analytical and acute, rather than emotional, poetical or imaginative.

TWO DISTINGUISHED QUEBEC PRIESTS HAVE A NARROW ESCAPE.

A Quebec despatch, (Feb. 3.) gives the following particulars: "Monsignor Hamel, rector of Laval University, and Abbe Begin, Principal of the Normal School, left here to visit the late Bishop of Chicoutimi and had a very narrow escape of losing their lives. After leaving the terminus of the Lake St. John Railway, and driving to Chicoutimi, they were caught in a great storm in descending a ravine and were overwhelmed by an avalanche of snow. Monsignor Hamel was completely buried, and Begin had only his mouth and one hand above the mass of snow. The latter finally extricated himself and succeeded in quickly disinterring Hamel; and the driver, who had a leg broken, pushed on to the nearest house and obtained assistance to enable them to continue their journey to Chicoutimi."

Keep the Stables Light.

Dark stables are an abomination, and should not be tolerated. There is no necessity to sacrifice comfort, either in winter or summer, to secure enough light. A horse's eyes are enlarged—the pupil of the eye is—by being kept in a dark stable; he has a harness put on him and suddenly brought out into the bright, glaring sunlight, which contracts the pupil so suddenly as to cause extreme pain. By persevering in this very foolish and injudicious as well as cruel practice, the nerves of the eye become impaired, and if continued long enough, loss of sight will ensue. To see how very painful it is to face a bright light after having been in the dark, take a walk some dark night for a short time, till the eye becomes accustomed to the darkness, then drop suddenly into some well lighted room and you will be scarcely able to see for a few moments in the sudden light. You know how painful it is to yourself, then why have your horse repeatedly to bear such unnecessary pain? A dark stable is invariably a damp one, and such stables we are not yet willing to put either a valuable working or driving horse in. Give good ventilation, let the sunshine and the air have a chance to effect an entrance, and your stables will be purer and more healthy than if you take such pains to exclude them and the good influence they invariably bring.
