## Summerside Aces Nip BYC Win Island Hockey Title

The Summerside Aces won the championship of the Prince Edward Island Senior "B" Hockey League at Civic Stadium Saturday night before a crowd which broke all attendance records for Summerside, and perhaps for the Island. 3,604 paid admission to see the Aces defeat B.Y.C. by the score of 4-2, and complete the final series with four straight victories.

Victories, 7-1 in Summerside Friday, April 5, and 6-4 and 3-1 in the Tuesday and Thursday Charlottetown games.

Vance Harris was again the big gun of the Aces attack, scoring 3 goals to run his total to 9 in the four games. Coke Grady potted the other Summerside marker. Merrill Pineau and Art Perry scored for the visitors.

The Aces picked up four penalties to one for B.Y.C., but the Youth Clubbers were not able to score on any of their power play efforts, and Harris fired his final goal when the Aces were playing a man short.

The Aces maintained a torrid pace throughout the first frame with the Aces having the better of the play, but being held off the score sheet time and again when Doyle made spectacular saves on ticketed drives.

Grant Grady was chased for slashing at the 4-minute mark but during the Summerside man-shortage B.Y.C. never came close. The visitors put up a much more effective attack when the sides evened up, and opened the

scoring at 9:04 when Pineau found an open corner after Whitlock and Perry had got him into scoring position with well-placed passes.

Four minutes later Coke Grady knotted the count, deflecting Ron MacArthur's long shot from right wing which hugged the ice all the way to Grady standing outside the crease.

In the final minutes the Aces kept almost constant pressure on Doyle who rose to sensational heights to keep the red shirts from scoring. The big goalie had 14 stops to Mann's nine.

Grant Grady got his second penalty at 7:06 of the middle frame. And this time BYC were much more dangerous. Mann made two fine saves, and a whistling shot from just inside the blue-line hit the goal post. As the visitors really made things hot.

Aces went out in front at 13:41. Vance Harris taking Shepherd's pass and sending a close-in drive that was partially stopped by Doyle, but the wafer dribbled into the corner of the cage. Harris repeated at 19:04 on a pass from Ulric Gallant, and with one second to go Art Perry blinked the red light with a shot from the right wing which penetrated the short side. Art carried over the blue-line, carefully nursed the disk till he saw the opening. It was a clear shot but Mann couldn't get over in time to block it.

The period ended with Aces leading 3-2. Doyle stopped 11 in this frame and Mann 5.

Vance Harris completed his "hat trick" at 1:31 of the final period ending the scoring for the night. After Coke Grady had been banished for interference, Harris and W. Shepherd broke loose from pressure play and Vance, taking Wally's pass, tucked his shot inside the post. The youth clubbers kept boring in and coming close on occasion, but Aces managed to hold on till the final siren. Doyle had 9 stops for a total of 34 and Harris stopped 7 in the period and 21 during the game.

## Boston Defeats Montreal Fleming Mackell Gets 2

BOSTON (CP)—Fleming Mackell led Boston Bruins out of the Stanley Cup wilderness Sunday night with two goals that blanked Montreal Canadiens 2-0 in the fourth game of the best-of-seven cup final.

The aroused Bruins, facing a 3-0 deficit in games going into Sunday night's battle, came up with a brilliant effort in possibly the best game of the series to date to make the count 3-1. The teams play again in Montreal Tuesday.

Checking beautifully and getting 100 per cent support from goalie Don Simmons, the Bruins played more to the form they showed during the regular National Hockey League season when they proved Canadiens' masters over a 15-game stretch with seven wins, four losses and four ties.

MACKELL HURTS HABS Ironically enough Mackell is a Montreal boy and he has been a Canadiens fan in his final. Including Sunday night's game the Bruins have been restricted to five goals in four games and Mackell had scored four of them. Montreal's total still stands at 10.

Mackell counted early and late—at 2:56 of the first period when the Bruins had a manpower advantage and at 19:40 of the third period when coach Toe Blake of Montreal pulled goalie Jacques Plante from the net in favor of an extra forward.

The beetle-browed Boston winger scored his first goal from the general area he scored his others in previous games. Haunting Plante's bailiwick Mackell grabbed Jerry Toppazzini's short

pass and virtually poked the puck around the corner of the net past Plante while the Bruins stormed the Montreal area.

Three players were in the penalty box at the time. Don Marshall of Montreal and Leo Labine of Boston had been waved off at a high-sticking duel. Dollard St. Laurent of Montreal followed them at 2:47 for high-sticking.

The Bruins drove in with a vengeance. The play started with Larry Regan digging the puck out toward the centre of the Montreal defence zone. Toppazzini managed to get his short pass to Mackell and the Bruins had set up the lead they fought so beautifully to protect.

NET LEFT OPEN Plante was taken from the net with 40 seconds to go in the third period after making a couple of false starts in which he had to hold his centre ice. Finally he scuttled to the bench. The Bruins gained possession in their own end and Don McKenney, the only other Bruin who had scored for his club in addition to Mackell, showed a pass to Leo Labine.

Labine carried it to centre ice and relayed to Mackell. Maurice (Rocket) Richard dropped back toward the Montreal net but Mackell fired just as he reached the Rocket for a perfect shot that the Rocket couldn't block.
