FIRST METHODIST CHURCH.—Rev. Joseph McLeod D. D. of Fredericton, N. B., occupies the pulpit of the First Methodist Church Sunday at the evening service.

PROMENADE CONCERT.—The promenade concert in the gardens last evening was greatly appreciated by the large number of people in attendance. The music by the Citizens' Band was well rendered.

CHRISTIAN CHURCH.—In the Central church tomorrow, the services will be conducted by Rev. R. W. Stevenson of Montague Bridge. Rev. Geo. Manifold will preach at the Christian church at Montague.

SALVATION ARMY.—Adjutant McGillvery and Capt. McIntyre, the incoming officers of the Salvation Army, are expected to-night by steamer Stanley. Their welcome meeting will be held to-night and to-morrow night Sunday. War Cry admission at the door to-night.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—Mr. W. G. Cunningham of Antigonish, N. S. had a narrow escape from bleeding to death recently. He had a tooth extracted and went to bed apparently as well as ever. Two hours later he woke up, having been bleeding all that time. The breaking of an artery was the cause. It was fortunate for Mr. Cunningham, that he woke when he did.

ANOTHER FATALITY.—Another distressing and probably fatal accident is recorded. While working in the mine at Bridgeville, N. S., part of the roof caved in upon Joseph Sutherland, breaking his back and severely injuring him internally, so that recovery is impossible. This makes the fourth distressing accident in Pictou county within ten days, three of the victims being killed on the rail.

BAPTIST SOCIAL IN SOURIS.—The strawberry and ice cream social held last Thursday evening in St. Patrick's Hall, Souris, was a success in every sense of the word. John Nichols, Esq., Annandale, presided with his usual geniality. Baskets were auctioned off by Mr. Arthur Mellish and brought good prices. The committee deserve to be congratulated upon their efforts in making this social one of the very best ever held in Souris. The amount realized was seventy five dollars.

BODY FOUND.—The body of John McCabe, of Tryon, who had been missing since the 9th inst., was found yesterday morning floating in the water below the race of the Tryon Woolen Mills. There were no discolorations or bruises of any kind, the hands being found stiff in the pockets as though the unfortunate man had walked deliberately in. He had left home without taking his hat. An inquest was held and a verdict was returned to the effect that the deceased came to his death by drowning while temporarily insane.

The Scott Act Election.


