Appeal By Toronto Man Of Court Decision Is Denied

A leave to appeal a decision by the Supreme Court in Summerside was heard by a Court of Criminal Appeal on Monday and turned down.
Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell and Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan and George J. Tweedy heard the case of Gerald DesRoches of Toronto who was sentenced to three years in the Dorchester Penitentiary when he was convicted of break, entry and theft at a Supreme Court sitting in Summerside last month.
Mr. Justice Tweedy heard the Summerside case and meted out the sentence to DesRoches after the Summerside man was found guilty by a jury.
Defence Counsel J. Watson MacNaught, Q. C., based his grounds for an appeal for his client on the following:
"(1) The verdict was unreasonable;
"(2) No evidence to support verdict;
"(3) The indictment contained a reference to the effect that one Lawrence Emmett Powers was associated with me despite the fact that we had been granted separate trials;
"(4) That the sentence imposed upon me by Mr. Justice George Tweedy was excessive."
D. O. Stewart, Q. C., acted for the Crown in the case.

SUMMERSIDE — Another capacity congregation greeted the Rev. E. H. Bean in the Church of Christ Disciples, last evening, as he delivered his second sermon in the Week of Prayer services.
Rev. Mr. Bean stated that "the opening words of the Lord's Prayer, addressing God as the Heavenly Father, brings Him down to earth. For we are taught to address Him as our Heavenly Father and we are here on earth. Man needs a heavenly father who is interested in His children on the earth. The speaker called upon his listeners to pray for others, reminding them of the words of St. Ambrose "If thou prayest for thyself alone, thou alone prayest for thyself. The person who keeps others out of his prayers keeps himself out of the prayers of others."
In reminding those present that Christians are called upon to honor the name of God, the speaker called it presumption on the part of man to invent new names for God and stated that it was nothing short of blasphemy to speak of God as "the man upstairs" or "old man with the whiskers."
It was pointed out that man is to honor God with his life as well as with words.

German Villagers Pray As Big Bomb Carted Off

LANGSCHEID, Germany (Reuters) — Residents of this small German village said prayers of thanksgiving on church steps Thursday and then toasted their deliverance at local inns after a six-ton wartime bomb was defused and trucked away.
An RAF bomb expert and a German fireman eased the three fuses from the bomb — found just before Christmas—as the villagers huddled in their cellars or waited at points outside the danger zone.
The biggest unexploded bomb to be found in West Germany since the war, it had been dropped by the RAF in a 1944 raid and lay undiscovered behind the Sorpe dam until the reservoir was drained for cleaning.
SIGNALS ALL WELL
After the 90-minute defusing operation, Ft. Lt. James Waters, who said his "most anxious" moment occurred as he left his wife Monday morning, shouted to another airman to notify her that all was well.
Snow was falling and the bomb had been dragged only half way out of the reservoir along a road cut through the lake mud when police yielded the residents' appeals to sound the all clear so that they could get back to the business of reheating their homes.
They had left doors and windows open for five hours as a precaution in case the bomb went off while they waited in cellars or outside the town.
Waters and Walter Mitzke of the Duesse/dorf fire department were the only two men within 1,400 feet during the defusing.
The first fuse was unscrewed by remote control from behind the dam wall and the other two by hand. As the fuses were loosened, water began to hiss out.
FULL OF WATER
The fuse chambers were full of water and two of the striking pins had penetrated the detonators but they had failed to explode. In the other chamber, the acid had failed to reach celluloid discs holding back the firing pin.
Within a few minutes of the siren, blast signalling the all clear, villagers, 650 of whom had been evacuated, streamed back into the streets.
Waters and Mitzke were entertained by local officials at a restaurant at nearby Meehne Lake while stores filled with shoppers and buses brought back 60 families of Canadian servicemen who had spent the day at Canadian Army camps at Hemer and Iserlohn near here.
While the villagers were gathering in inns, a heavy truck was loading the bomb at the edge of the reservoir just below the town for the trip to Dorsten, on the lower Rhine, where it will be destroyed at a demolition camp.

Late Train Delays Repairs To Damaged Street Pump

SUMMERSIDE — Repairs to Summerside's Harvard Street pumping station which it had been hoped could be affected by midnight last night were delayed due to the late arrival of the boat train from Borden which was expected to be carrying the necessary parts for the pump.
Instead of arriving at her usual 8:30 p.m. time she was not expected in Summerside until near midnight.
Councillor R. W. Dewar, chairman of the water and sewerage committee, stated last evening that repair work to the pump was expected to get underway as soon as the parts arrived and barring accidents the work should be completed in about four hours.
Other pumps are able to handle the normal supply of water but in the event of a fire a serious situation might develop and for this reason Councillor Dewar urged citizens to exercise strict conservation.

Mr. Harvard said the trouble in the Harvard Street pump, which supplies the major part of the town's water requirements, was discovered over the past weekend, but it wasn't until the pump had been dismantled yesterday that it was found that three bearings had burned out and would need immediate replacement.
He got in contact with Fred C. Morrison, the distributor, in New Glasgow, N.S., at once to have the parts flown to Summerside but weather conditions halted air travel which necessitated sending them by express.
