M. Deves, French Minister of Justice on...

M. Deves, French Minister of Justice on the 16th, introduced a bill proposed by Senator Barbey rendering Princes liable to expulsion by a decree of the President of the Republic. A motion for urgency was granted and the bill at once referred to a committee.

The abstract of the new Mexican treaty...

The abstract of the new Mexican treaty shows that Mexico agrees that all articles, the produce of the United States, admitted to Mexico under it, shall be admitted free; not only of federal but also of all local and transit duties. In the free list, seventy-three articles of American and twenty-eight of Mexican production are specified and made free of duty.

The French steamers "Eloise" recently...

The French steamers "Eloise" recently sailed from Nossi to the ship laborers. The natives became alarmed and assembled under arms to prevent the French from making contracts. The Portuguese military intervened but the natives resisted and were routed only after having lost 75 killed and wounded. The "Eloise" returned to Nossi without having accomplished her object.

The examination of the prisoners charged...

The examination of the prisoners charged with conspiracy to murder was resumed at Dublin on the 15th. The following persons were placed in the prisoner's dock: James Carey, the councillor, Joseph Brady, Timothy Kelly, Joseph Hanlon, Daniel Farley, Fagan, Patrick Delaney, Carman Fitzharris, Thomas Caffrey. The courtroom was densely crowded. The prisoners as usual an indifferent manner. Patrick Cahill deposed that in passing Chapel Izod gate on the evening of May 6th, he saw a car driving rapidly out of Phoenix Park. One of the men on the car he identified as Caffrey. This completes the quartette of men who were on the car. An old man named Flynn created some amusement by saying that after cricket playing he walked through the park, a little past the polo ground, he saw a car standing on the grass; the driver was beside his horse. Further on four men were lying on a grassy slope, two on each side. He saw James Carey sitting on a seat near Gough's statue. He left him in company with another man whom he did not know. He then saw...

Burke alight from a car and join Lord Frederick Cavendish. A witness named Huxley deposed that he heard four or five men lying at a place where the murders were committed. He identified Kelly as being amongst the group. Further on he saw a man in a cab, standing. The man was not in the prisoners' dock now. He met successively a stationary individual; Mr. Burke, walking, and a stranger. Flynn's identification of Carey was complete. He spoke to him while he was sitting on the seat. He recognized Kelly as the man he afterwards laborer, identified Fitzharris as one who was waiting near Carwith with several others. Meagle, one of the bicyclists, identified Brady as resting beside the road on the evening of the murder. He said he saw four men, one of whom was Brady, tussling. After further evidence corroborative of Kavanagh's testimony the case was adjourned until Saturday.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR,—In the weekly Patriot, of the 15th inst., a Mr. B. Toombs, of Moncton, having the credit of the Island, and the interest of his business before his eyes, makes some statements about what Mr. A. McNeill said at a public meeting relative to some of the exports from the Island—figures of which he, Mr. McNeill, obtained from Mr. Lydiard—a public official as he is pleased to style me. Now, if Mr. B. Toombs will take the trouble to turn up a paper, THE EXAMINER, published the day after the meeting, he will find no such mass of oats and potatoes as he has attempted to make. What Mr. McNeill did say was, "our shipments of oats to Nova Scotia from Queen's and King's Counties alone, were 420,633 bushels; the exports from Prince County are not at hand, but might be estimated at least at one-third the above quantity, which would make a total of 560,870 bushels; New Brunswick, say 120,000 bushels. Of potatoes, to Nova Scotia, 320,400 bushels; to New Brunswick, 10,000 bushels."

If advertising the firm was the object (as we suppose) the more straightforward course would have been to insert a short notice in one of the newspapers that the firm of which he was partner, have, during the year 1882, imported into Moncton alone, the enormous quantity of over 10,000 bushels oats. When he flies into print again I would recommend him either to put on his specs, or get some friend to read figures for him. If B. Toombs really wants to know what oats and potatoes were shipped from P. E.
