It is understood that with traffic it will gradually become a hard surface pavement.

There is still some work to do, however, in providing good drainage. Drains on either side of the road need to be cleared of gravel and in some instances small culverts replaced by larger ones. It is expected this work will be completed before the heavy fall rains.
